

Saw a three masted Schooner
steaming to the S. E.
square fore topsails forward

Longitude

then twenty four hours commenced with a fresh wind from the S.W. at 3 P.M. steady rain, wind and sea part from the S. later part strong from the Westward. two sails in sight one the Mt. Ballouen a three masted ship 4 sails. Schooner starting about S.E. so ends this day's latitude North.

Longitudinal

commenced with a fresh breeze from the North-
 West, & at 10th all sail set, at 2 P.M. made
 land, at 7 left to the wind, heading to the
 S.W. middle and part high - latter part more

Friday December 16th 1869.
commenced with a a fresh breeze blowing
land down, all sail set - starting 9 A.M. going
from the N.W. at 2 P.M. gained with the
Mt. Wallaston, simplified in Ship Aug. at 6
left - to visit the shears just aback. Sailed
back the hour of the night. After part of
the night sailed forward. at 3 P.M. commenced
to get the chains up & bend them. at 6 the
boat went in and rounded around an island
this days work I shall make thirty six hours
long. I then keep harbor journal

Dec 3. M^o. December 16. (of Dec 17) reached Lima
 as came for anchor in San Quinton bay
 the Dock of Isabellos going at anchor. having
 been there two days. when his boat came in
 from fishing she gave us a lot of fish and our
 landward boat fishing I got some. The artist boat
 were claiming a gift about 11/2 bushels of corn
 (maize) for a large Turquoise. In the latter part of
 the afternoon the Ship that I was in I sailed and
 the Mido direct from San Francisco. I left for
 the Isabellos at the residence of Mr. H. H. H. H.
 At home. One Eddy had been in the Ensign
 I think I should have been in the Ensign
 to him if I had been. I think I should
 have voted for him. although I had had to
 vote for him to support it. during the night
 in a boat was an officer & boatmen on deck
 at a time

Quinton December 17th/64 at Anich
Saturday December 17/64

this day commenced with a moderate gale of wind from the S & W with rain gave the ship 10 fathoms making 60 fathoms in all. so far we have not done any thing to speak of with the exception of catching a few fish. & getting a few lines ready for fishing.

pleasant. - some of the boats went fishing & giving
the Captain went - & secured out - the Sharrel
caught - but a few fish. I have been on board all
day. wrote one letter to Colia & gave my mind
very well.

commenced with fine weather, two ships
went up the lagoon and four more arrived
and two orders to day, I went ashore to day
after calms. Met did not get any, the Captain
Harker, Bat - Gornold, & Mearns. The Nassau
one spent whole (100 barrels)

commenced with fine weather. boats of action
(three of them) the starboard boat shot - at one hour
did not hoald on, the Muske left at 4 PM
to day Mrs Capt Thomas & Mrs Capt Dexter of
the Merch came on board & stop - a short time

fine weather, three boats of skating. I went a short time myself. The sails arrived to day the ship, Arnolda & Bark John, Jr West. at 4 PM. here - up, and steered to the Southward.

This day commenced with a moderate breeze from the NW, at sail at daybreak S & S. about 11 A.M. lowered all five boats after blackfish. the larboard boat struck killed 9, & saved, at 9 sets. Cape to of Sea Dog island, at 8.

commenced moderate & continued so through
the day. At 4 P.M. snow after sulphur bottles
L & W. but, stopped through the day
trying to get the water but our boat
without success. At 9 P.M. light to the wind
& had a short walk. Snow moderate from
the North & Westward so ends this day.
