Thursday July 27th / 65

commenced moderate from the Southward at 2.00
shifted to the NE and blew strong took the
sails and stood to the NE under three sails at
4 came up to the ice during the forenoon ran
to the E Ed. at 10.00 came up to the ice head
by the wind and stood to the SE. at 2 signalled a
bark called it the Stephania latter part strong
from the SW
Lat 69.45 N

Frida Sub 20th 1865

commenced fresh at 5.4 A light one sail in W
at 6.30 lowered after a stinker took him ab-
side about 9. saw him in, saved over side of boat
at 5.30 A started the work & don't reefed the
topside at 8 close reefed the fore & main topsails
later lost stow from the Id heading about 7
47 6 1/2

Saturday Aug 29 1865

commenced strong shortly after the 1st heading. At
S.M. employed boiling at 11. Both came up to
ice soon after and held any from it at 10 P.M.
finished boiling a stinker. moderate latter part
with a dull on. standing to the S.E. wind from the
S.M. rather wetting. (thinner) thick

Sunday Feb. 20th 1830

commenced with a light breeze from the N.W. & heading to the S.W. at 5 A.M. moderate breeze and thick. Imposed the gear part, clearing out the fore & breaking our sugar molasses at 2 P.M. strong breeze & thick & the typhoon. at 1 P.M. per the fore. slow. blowing quite strong. under short sail Sat. 6th

Monday July 31. 1765

commenced with a heavy fog from the S. and
showed itself heading to the S. E. as part of the fog
to middle part of the day. At 2 P.M. wind
about N.E. later in the day laid in light and
gained with the rain. The rain fell in season, the
Europe of off. The rain was heavy and
seen in the clouds. The rain was heavy and
down the south side of the mountain. (444 7)

Wednesday August 23rd 1865

commenced light all sail we stood to the S. E. at 3 A.M. came up to the ice. During the forenoon got a barrel from the Europa and a little wood, and also some wood from the Oriskany and let her have five cask of water at 2.30 P.M. raised a whale hauled the L. E. Boy boat. A boat did not see him again. latter part thick fog, wind from the E. working to the S. E. during the night. Lat 76.4200 N. Long 96.0830 W.

Thursday August 3rd 1865

commenced light from the S. & E. gradually passing working to the S. & W. at 11 A.M. took the Park & Benj. Cummings working this season. at 9 A.M. game with the Captain Crockett & Benj. Cummings. later light & foggy. Latitude 43° 45' N. Longitude 72° 45' W.

Friday August 9th / 65

resummed light under way, and up to the ice at 3.45. We are left of running to the ice down the ice middle bay. At 4.00 doing the afternoon to two sails in sight. Pils Holola & Jirich Pegg. at 4.30 left to the wind heading to the East with the head winds aback.

Saturday August 3rd

commenced with a moderate breeze from the N. thick
fog, at 3.30 P.M. Kept on running the ice down steering
about 100° at 5 P.M. came to a fleet of ships and
had a general game. Northern Light, Europa (brk) (brk)
Sagada. After dark very light from C.N.B. standing
to the S.E.

Scrub. Height 6 ft. 6 in.

commenced with a light breeze from the N.E. on the 1st with heading to the S.E. squalls and heavy rain - strong breeze all night with heading about E. on the 2d raised land on the E. shore as is better seen south to the N.W. from near strong all the night sail in thick fog. good sail in sight
