

Remarks on Board the Ship Charles April 1838.

125th Wednesday 4th 1838 Fresh breezes from S.E. steering to the North. hands employ^d in ships duty. Lat^d 16-10. Long 78. West.

126 Thursday 5th 1838. Moderate weather and fine breeze from S.E. steering to the N.E. latter part saw the Land. Lat^d 14-30 Long 78-10

127 Friday 6th 1838. Strong breezes from S.E. standing off and on in hopes of seeing Whales. Saw an English Brig close in shore steering to the North. Lat^d 14-10 S. Long 78-20 W.

128 Saturday 7th 1838. Strong breezes at S.E. land in sight. Lowered a boat after sword fish without success. Lat^d 14 S. Long 78 West

129 Sunday 8th 1838. Strong breezes from S.E. going to N.E. Nothing at all to be seen but the Coast of Peru. all hands at leisure Lat^d 13-30 Long 78

130 Monday 9th 1838. Moderate breezes at S.E. steering to the N.E. at 4 P.M. spoke the ship *Harvard* of Nantucket 6 Months out 160 Bbls. Lat^d 13 S. Long 77-50 West

131 Tuesday 10th 1838. Light breezes and fine weather steering to the N.E. lowered after Black fish caught one to the Star Board. Lat^d 10-47 Long 78-50 West

132 Wednesday 11th 1838. Moderate breezes and pleasant weather steering N and N. Nothing in sight but Black fish. Lat^d 9-10 the Harbour Boat sounds this day. Lat^d 9 S. Long 79 West.

133 Thursday 12th 1838. Light breezes and pleasant. Hands employ^d in ships duty. Nothing in sight. Lat^d 7-50 S. Long 80-50 W.

134 Friday 13th 1838. Light breezes some part calm a ship in sight a stern plenty of Black fish in sight also the Land. Lat^d 5-40 Long 81-50

135 Saturday 14th 1838. Sail in sight on our Starboard quarter also Payton Head. Black fish. Most part of these 24 hours light breeze. Lat^d 5-30 Long 82-

136 Sunday 15th 1838. Light breeze from S.E. spoke the ship *Elizabeth* Starboard of Nantucket 5 Months out 150 Bbls. carrying off Payton Head. Lat^d 5-20 Long 81-10

137 Monday 16th 1838. Light breeze and pleasant. Saw 2 Ships 2 Schooners and 1 ship saw a school of sperm whales 10 to 12 bow the boat the Starboard Boat struck, had to cut from them on account of losing all the oars. and being dark the whale a turning. Payton Head in sight. Lat^d 5-18 Long 81-30

138 Tuesday 17th 1838. Moderate weather 2 ships in sight steering in for Payton Head. Lat^d 5-20 Long 81-40

139 Wednesday 18th 1838. Light breezes and pleasant, Payton Head in sight. one ship and schooner. Lat^d 5-18 S. Long 81-20

140 Thursday 19th 1838. Light breezes and pleasant weather, Payton Head in sight. Also 4 or 5 Schooners in shore. Lat^d 5-20 S. Long 81-40

141 Friday 20th 1838. Pleasant weather, saw a ship on our bow a boiling of the land in sight. Lat^d 5-22 S. Long 81-36

142 Saturday 21st 1838. Light breeze one ship in sight also the Land Lat^d 5-20 Long 82-

143 Sunday 22nd 1838. Pleasant weather and light breeze 2 ships. and Payton Head in sight. Lat^d 5-22 Long 81-30

144 Monday 23rd 1838. Light breezes from S.E. steering to the North due West. Payton Head and Cape Blanco in sight. Lat^d 4-40 S. Long 81-50

145 Tuesday 24th 1838. Pleasant breezes from S.E. steering to the Westward at 4 P.M. saw a school of sperm whales going quick to the East. lowered the boats without success. Lat^d 3-30 Long 82-50 West.
