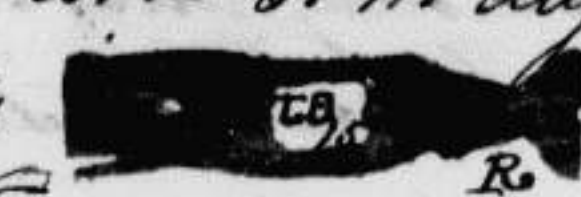


Ship Charles Coast of Peru June 1839.

554. Thursday June 6th 1839. Pleasant trades headed to the S. W. day light
saw a shoal of sperm whales. succeeded in taking 4  the Harbours boat
got stove by a loose whale and did not get any. 1 p.m. got them alongside
at 8 p.m. finished cutting the small whale. Noon Lat 5-54 S. Long 87-35

555. Friday 7th. Strong trades and pleasant. lying by with a large whale
alongside employed boiling 7 p.m. saw a shoal of large whales.
lowered 2 boats succeeded in taking one.  at 11 p.m.
took him alongside. 3 p.m. commenced cutting the other whales. dark
finished his body. Noon Lat 5-18 S. Long 88-15 West.

556. Saturday 8th. Pleasant trades. no wind. took in one of the whales
heads. noon commenced cutting the other large whale dark finished
the body. one head and one calf alongside. Noon Lat 5-18 S. Long 88-15

557. Sunday 9th. Light trades and pleasant. 11 A.M. took in the junk
and one calf. the other remains alongside. employ? boiling. Noon Lat 5-09
Long 88-07 West.

558. Monday 10th. Moderate and pleasant took in the last calf & dark.
finished boiling. noon Lat 4-49 S. Long 88-07 West.

559. Tuesday 11th. Fresh trades and cloudy. employ? cooking and cleaning
ship headed to the eastward. noon Lat 5-01 S. Long 88-13 W.

560. Wednesday 12th. Strong trades and pleasant the 5 whales turned up 1 p.m.
saw finbacks. noon Lat 5-5 S. Long 88-47 N. 24 West.

561. Thursday 13th. Light trades and pleasant day light. commenced stowing
down. at dark have stowed 107 lbs. so ends. noon Lat 5-23 S. Long 88-01

562. Friday 14th. Light trades and pleasant. employed stowing. shed at sundown
finished stowing down this day 52 lbs. and one pipe between 6 lbs.
so ends. and all ready for home. Noon Lat 5-54 S. Long 88-10 W.

563. Saturday 15th. Strong trades and cloudy. headed to the E. S. E. 10 miles headed to the
S. E. W. Hunt heads to the E. S. E. all hands at leisure. noon Lat 5-48 S. Long 87-04

564. Sunday 16th. Strong trades with passing rain squalls. headed to the S. E. W.
nothing in port. Hunt heads to the E. S. E. all hands at leisure but no
the land day. noon Lat 5-58 S. Long 87-26 W. for Chm. 88-54 West.

565. Monday 17th. Strong trades with passing rain squalls. 9 A.M. headed
to the S. E. W. at noon saw sperm whale of the sea beam kept
off for them. 2 p.m. luff to the wind. 3 p.m. saw them again.
lowered the boat. without. sight at sundown came on board.
headed to the E. S. E. noon Lat 6-33 S. Long 86-45 W.

566. Tuesday 18th. Strong trades. headed to the S. E. W. 10 miles. saw a shoal
of sperm whales on the weather bow. 11 A.M. lowered the boat. the boats
boat struck on their line started. gave chase. succeeded in taking the
small one.  the Harbours boat run in to the third boat. then saw
one side of him. the whale went under such head way that the boat could not
be stopped. nor the other one get out of the way. at 5 p.m. got the whale alongside
as the ship was after the other boats cut him in dark. traced forward. headed
to the E. S. E. by the kind. noon Lat 6-35 S. Long 87-10 West.

567. Wednesday 19th. Moderate trades and pleasant. headed to the S. E. W.
employed boiling and mending the third boat. saw finbacks 5 p.m. finished
boiling and headed to the E. S. E. noon Lat 7-14 S. Long 87-40 West.

568. Thursday 20th. Light trades and pleasant. employed mending the third
boat. steering to the E. S. E. 9 miles. saw a large sperm whale on the weather
beam. tacked ship to the south. and lowered the boat. the third boat
struck him and then went under. took him. stowed the boat
came on board. noon Lat 7-55 S. Long 87-29 West.
