Wednesday June the 2nd

These 24 hours commenced with a calm heading to the eastward bailing the whale with 2 ships in sight spoke the Canada of New Bedford Capt. Remond at 4 P.M. saw right whales but did not lower middle and latter part fine breeze with cloudy weather at 3 A.M. saw right whales lowered 4 boats but returned to the ship without success at 8 A.M. were ship with one ship in sight heading N.W. Lat Long

Thursday June the 3rd

These 24 hours commenced with a fine breeze from the N.W. heading N.E. by E. at 12 P.M. saw right whales lowered 3 boats at 1 P.M. came to the ship without success were ship heading N.E. at 4 P.M. saw a right whale but did not lower at sunset took in sail and steared N.E. middle and latter part strong breeze at 4 A.M. reefed the topsail at 6 A.M. reefed off E. by N. and begun stowing down Oil the main hatchway with 4 ship in sight Lat Long

Friday June the 4th

These 24 hours commenced with a gale from the N.W. heading N.E. by E. at 1 P.M. took in the foretopsail and closed reefed the main topsail at 2 P.M. finished stowing down Oil with one ship in sight at 4 P.M. heaved

to the wind heading at ~~N.W.~~ middle and latter part more moderate at 3 A.M. set the fore and mizzen topsail steering N.E. at 4 A.M. hoisted the reefs out of the topsails and set the topgallant sails

Lat 53° 55' Long 155° 00' Saturday June the 5th

These 24 hours commenced with a fine breeze from the westward steering N.E. with all sail out at sunset shortened sail middle part light breeze latter part foggy at 11 A.M. set all sail with a fine breeze steering N.E. by E. Lat Long

Sunday June the 6th

These 24 hours commenced with a strong breeze from the eastward steering N.E. at 4 P.M. saw right whales lowered 3 boats but returned to the ship again without success the whale bound to the windward at 6 P.M. saw a ship to the leeward at 4 P.M. took in sail heaved to the wind heading N.E. middle and latter a gale Lat Long

Monday June the 7th

These 24 hours commenced with a gale from the eastward heading N.E. by E. at 4 P.M. more moderate set the foresail heading S. middle and latter part a light breeze and foggy weather heading N.E. Lat Long
