April 1858

Friday the 12th
These 24 hours fresh breezes steering NW by W
so ends this Day Lat 12° 57'
Long 135° 41'

Saturday the 13th
Lat 13° 45'
Long 138° 50'

Sunday the 14th
These 24 hours fresh breezes course NW by W
so ends this Day in Lat 14° 56'
Long 141° 22'

Monday the 15th
These 24 hours scenery NW by W Lat 16° 31'
Long 144° 35'

Tuesday the 16th
These 24 hours light winds steering NW by W
Lat 17° 57'
Long 147° 01'

Wednesday the 17th
These 24 hours light airs from the Eastward
steering W by N Lat 18° 33'
Long 148° 46' by Chronometer
Long 147° 55' by Lunar
Chronometer too fast

Thursday the 18th
These 24 hours light winds Lat 19° 02'
Long 150° 38'

Friday April the 19th
These 24 hours light airs steering NW by W
Lat 19° 23'
Long 152° 11'

Saturday the 20th
These 24 hours light winds Lat 20° 17'
Long 153° 56'

Sunday the 21st
These 24 hours light winds accompanied with
rain squalls at 10 AM saw cyclone
no observation

Monday the 22^d
Begins with light airs at 5 P.M. saw the East
end of Mowle bearing NW by W distant 25 miles
later Part light winds cyclone 3/4 Mowle in sight
4 2 Ships in sight so ends this Day

Tuesday the 23^d
Begins with a light breeze from the W
at 2 P.M. saw Morotoi at 6.30 got the anchors
into the Schoes Middle Part at noon anchored
in the Port of Lahiana in 20 fathoms of water
at daylight weighed anchor & hauled shearer
in shore 2 Whale ships in port besides the
Charles Crew the Majestic of New Bedford
18 months out with 1500 bbls of oil & the
James Maury of New Bedford 18 months
out with 200 bbls of whale & 50 bbls of sper-
at 9 AM took a raft of water cask ashore
this ends this Day
