

Remarks in Board off the Fox Islands

Friday May the 31st 1850

Begins with a moderate gale from the South West by South ship heading West by North started the oil off deck into the tanks at 9 P M started the works ones more at 10.30 overed ship at twoered ship again at daylight strong winds & ruff sea made some sail in hopes to make the land early at 4 saw the land at 6 the ship in the passage between the Island Unlia & Sigumur saw a large quantity of birds of different kinds passed throug heavy tide rips current seemed to be setting to the South after we got passed the Islands came into smooth water something is very exceptable sturing North West by North at 10 P M saw a ship astern at meridian fine weather in Lat 52.34

Saturday June the 1st 1850

Begins with fresh breezes from the West by South ship heading North West by North at 4 P M finished boilding, middle Part light airs & calms the sea very smooth & overcast weather Latter Part light winds from the North East & North ship on the Western tack the watch employed in fitting a new waist Boat & repairing one of the Bow Boats fine weather a ever was so ends this Day

No observation through neglect

Remarks on board in the Kamtschataka sea

Sunday June the 2^d 1850

Begins with a light breeze from the North by East & North with smooth weather ship on the Western tack the watch employed in repairing the Bow Boat & at various other jobs of ships duty Middle Part light airs from the Northward Latter Part light airs & calms & overcast weather the watch employed in repairing the Bow Boat so ends this Day in Lat 54.03

Monday the 3^d

Begins with light airs & calms the watch repairing the Boat smooth sea & overcast weather Middle Part light airs & calms Latter Part the same the watch employed in repairing the Waist Boat a ship in sight so ends this Day in Lat 54.06

Tuesday the 4th

Begins with light winds from the Eastward the sea as smooth as a lake steering North West the watch employed as above Middle Part fresh breezes took in the top-gallant-sails Latter Part reef the top-sails had several snow squalls the water very smooth the watch employed in repairing the Waist Boat thus ends these 24 hours in Lat 56.46

Wednesday the 5th

Begins with moderate gales from the North East now & then a snow squall ship on the Western tack the watch employed as above Middle Part light winds with snow Latter Part the watch employed as above saw pintacks fine weather but cool the thermometer stands at 35 degrees farien heat Lat 57.51 Long 176.00
