

Remarks on board in the Kamtschataka Sea

Thursday the 6th of June 1850
 Begins with light winds from the Westward
 the watch employed in repairing the Waist-Brut
 saw finbacks saw 2 rite whales going to the
 south East lowered for them without success
 middle Part nothing of note Latter Part
 light winds from the South West steering
 North West by North the watch employed as
 above 3 ships in sight 2 of them boiling
 so ends this Day in Lat 59.15

Friday the 7th
 Begins with light winds & snow squalls
 steering North West by North spoke the
 ship Columbus of Fairhaven 6 months
 out with 50 bls of sperin Latter Part
 fresh breezes with snow saw 2 ships to the
 windward last 6 hours steering North North
 West so ends this Day in Lat 60.58
 Long 177.37

Saturday the 8th
 Begins with fresh breezes with snow
 squalls from the North East steering
 North North West at 2 P.M. spoke the
 Envoy of New Bedford Walker 500 bls this
 season re report ice a short distance
 to the North took ship to the South by East
 going back where we saw the whales in the
 latitude of 55 this afternoon there is ice making
 on board the ship middle Part strong winds from
 the North East & cold overcast weather
 Latter Part strong winds from the North saw 4
 ships all steering to the Southward & Westward
 so ends this Day in Lat 59.53
 Long 177.09

at 9 o'clock observed
 said to not quarter, weather

Sunday June the 9th 1850
 Begins with strong winds from the North North
 East steering to the Southward saw a
 plenty of Polar whales lowered without success
 middle Part strong winds Latter the same saw
 several whales so ends this Day Lat 59.56

Monday the 10th
 Begins with strong winds from the North
 North West saw 2 whales to the windward
 lowered without success middle Part nothing
 of note Latter Part fresh breezes from the
 Northward saw 2 whales lowered without success
 at 11 A.M. the wind died away and set in
 foggy so ends this Day no Observation

Tuesday the 11th
 Begins with light winds from the North
 East spoke the ship Armata of New London
 8 months out with 300 bls of oil 150 sperin
 middle & Latter Parts light airs from the North
 North East so ends this Day Lat 59.23

Wednesday the 12th
 Begins with light airs at 3 P.M. saw a whale
 lowered & chased to 3 without success middle Part
 calm Latter Part light airs from the South
 West steering North by West so ends this Day
 Lat 60.23

Thursday the 13th
 Begins with light winds from the South West
 steering North West by North saw one whale lowered without
 success middle Part foggy Latter Part at 5.30 A.M. saw a whale
 so shut in thick fog lost sight of the whale at 11 let up
 again so ends this Day Lat 61.30
