

Remarks on board in the sea of Anader

Wednesday July the 10th 1850
Begins with light winds & fog saw 2 whales
middle & latter part nothing of note

Thursday the 11th
Begins with light winds & fine weather
saw whales the bow boat struck but
the whale got away latter part saw
whale a long distance off so ends this day

Friday the 12th
Begins with light winds & fine
weather saw whales & lowered without
success middle latter part fine weather saw
whales chased them without success
land in sight so ends this day
Lat 44.46

Saturday the 13th
Begins with light winds & fine weather
saw whales chased them bayhooked one
did not see him afterwards latter part saw
whales very wild

Sunday the 14th
Begins with light winds middle & latter
parts thick weather chased whales without
success so ends this day

Monday the 15th
Begins with light winds & fine weather
saw a few whales the bow boat got
one middle part cut in the whale
latter part the watch employed in
boiling

Long 178.40 East

Tuesday July the 16th 1850
Begins with light winds & fine weather as
ever was 8 ships in sight spoke the
ship Rabions of New Bedford 13 months
out with 2200 Bbls of oil
the watch employed in boiling at 8 P.M.
shut in thick fog middle & latter parts
the same so ends this day

Wednesday the 17th
Begins with light winds & thick weather
the watch employed in boiling
middle & latter parts the same so ends this day

Thursday the 18th
Begins with light winds & thick weather
the watch employed in boiling spoke
the ship Jefferson of New London
with 14 whales at 10 P.M. finished boiling
latter part saw the land partially covered
with snow saw several ships & a
great many humpbacks the watch
employed in starting oil into the tanks

Friday the 19th
Begins with strong breezes from the
Eastward thick weather latter part light
winds & thick weather spoke the Barque
Columbia of Sag Harbour with 8 whales this
season so ends this day
