

Remarks on board bound to the Sandwich Islands

Friday September the 27th 1850

Begins with a fresh breeze from the South South west one ship in sight middle part squally at 3 o'clock the wind changed to the west latter part light winds from the North west steering South by East 1st East one ship in sight Lat 38° 05' Long 158° 06'

Saturday the 28th

Begins with a fine breeze from the North west steering South by East middle part the same spoke the ship Hannibal of New London latter part light winds 2 ships in sight Lat 36° 02' Long 157° 21'

Sunday the 29th

Begins with light airs from the westward steering South by East the watch employed in bundling line middle & latter light winds from the Southward Lat 35° 02' Long 156° 20'

Monday the 30th

Begins with a strong breeze from the South west by South middle part strong winds & squally at 5 A.M. the wind changed to the North west latter part a strong breeze from the North & torrents of rain the ship Hannibal close to us so ends this Day No observation

Ship Charles Drew of New Bedford

Tuesday October the 1st 1850

Begins with a fresh breeze from the North with rain steering South by East middle & parts much the same latter part steering South 2 ships in sight the watch employed in washing ship Lat 30° 34' Long 156° 12'

Wednesday the 2nd

Begins with a strong breeze from the South west middle & latter parts much the same Lat 28° 25' Long 155° 37'

Thursday the 3rd

Begins with a strong breeze from the West South West steering South ~~west~~ by East the watch employed in fitting a new jib say middle & latter parts light winds from the West South West Lat 25° 54' Long 155° 19'

Friday the 4th

Begins with light winds from the South West by West middle part light baffling winds from the Southward latter part light winds from the South South East Lat 25° 24' Long 155°

Saturday the 5th

Begins with light winds & squalls from the South & Eastward middle & latter parts light baffling winds & torrents of rain No observation
