

Ship C. W. Morgan in the S. Pacific Ocean
 Sunday Dec 28th 1845 of New Zealand
 Began with light breeze from S.W. and
 heading W by N at 7 took in light sails
 and sent ship to the S. and saw nothing
 of note the latter one sail in sight at 10 A.M.
 saw the North Cape of New Zealand bearing S.E.
 dist 25 miles and the wind West heading S.W.
 S. to wind Lat 34.00 S Long 172.28 E

Monday Dec 29th 1845
 Began with fresh breeze from W.S.W. heading
 to the S.W. and the North Cape in sight at 3 P.M.
 reef topsails it rained at 5 saw the Three Kings
 bearing S.W. dist 10 miles and wore ship to the
 North one bark in sight to Windward, at 7 took in
 sail for the night the latter part strong winds
 from the S. heading to the Westward at 10
 spoke the bark Bella from F. Haven 12 Mon out
 300 so goes the time Lat 33.24 S Long 172.05 E

Tuesday Dec 30th 1845
 Began with fresh winds from S.W. and heading
 to the Westward in fore with the Bella
 the latter strong wind W.S.W. and heading S.W. and
 reef topsails to wind Lat Long

Wednesday Dec 31st 1845
 Began with fresh wind from the S.W. and
 heading to the S.W. under short sail at
 8 fore & mizzen topsails in the middle and latter
 strong winds and heading S.E. the weather
 clear so wind Lat 34.24 Long 172.08 E

Thursday Jan 1st 1846
 Began with strong wind from the S. and
 heading by the wind to the S.E. at 1 P.M.
 past a ship a hater a whale the middle
 & latter part strong wind and under short sail
 at 12 saw the Passage bar N.E. Lat 34.15 S Long 172.15 E

Ship C. W. Morgan in the S. Pacific Ocean
 Friday January 2nd 1846 of New Zealand
 Began with fresh wind from S.W. and heading
 N.E. in towards the Ring at 8 P.M. wore
 ship to the Westward the Land 8 miles distance
 the middle and latter fine weather & saw black
 fish to wind Lat 33.15 S Long 171.40 E

Saturday Jan 3rd 1846
 Began with fine breeze from S. and heading
 over the ground the latter part light air from
 the South and heading W.S.W. and brought on
 Sun Fish one sail in sight to wind the latter
 hour Lat 33.24 S Long 171.21 E

Sunday January 4th 1846
 Began with light air from the South and
 heading W.S.W. with all sail set middle
 calm latter a fine breeze from S.W. heading
 S.W. at 9 P.M. saw a whale Lat 33.40
 S Long 171.10 E

Monday Jan 5th 1846
 Began with fine weather wind S.W. at 8
 took the last whale alone dist 8 from hater
 at 7 finished the bodies of one at 5 A.M.
 from hater the latter and a hard rain storm
 of Mischance finished the body so wind the
 wind S.W.

Tuesday Jan 6th 1846
 Began with heavy gale from S.W. and
 took in the back at 5 spoke the Strider of
 S. Bradford 25.5 of S. at 8 from boiling on a
 small scale the middle blowing a heavy
 gale and at 8 P.M. cold clear at 11 a heavy
 heavy sea on and under fore and aft sails &
 wore ship to the S.E. the sail to the
 heavy so wind Lat 33.40 S
 Long 171.08 E
