Monday Feb 9th 1846

Begins with fine breeze from E & heading N by E.
and at 4 the land out of sight at 8 took
in light sail the middle & latter fine and
staring to the S. W.

Lat 32.54 Long 174.38 E

Tuesday Feb 10th 1846

Begins with fine breeze from E and pleasant
weather staring to the S. W. at 8 P.M. starting
sail for the night & left N.E. the latter
fine and the sail in sight & we starting
N.W. & end in a whale.

Lat 33.46 Long 174.45 E

Wednesday Feb 11th 1846

Begins with light breeze from E starting
N.W. and one Bark in sight at 8 P.M.
speak Bark Bulk of S. Haul the latter part
fine weather & starting N.W. & S.W. & end
one Bark in sight and the N. Cape Barine
S.E. W. dist 30 miles.

Lat 33.58 Long 174.58 E

Thursday Feb 12th 1846

Begins with light breeze from E and
starting N.W. & the King in sight. Barine
S.W. dist 24 miles at 8 P.M. saw 2 large
whales a boat 5 miles of E. toward head of
me at night came on at 7 P.M. came on N.E.
& took in sail & left to the latter part saw
nothing of note sounds then 4 hours.

Lat 34.20 Long 175.40 E

Friday Feb 13th 1846

Begins with fine breeze from N.E. and
starting for the whales but did not see them
at 8 P.M. spoke the ship Charles of N. Bedford
we left the latter part wind from the North
& sailing head on E.N.E. in company with the bark
London Packet of N. Bedford. Lat 33.33 Long 175.15 E

of the North Cape of New Zealand
Saturday Feb 14th 1846

Begins with fine breeze from S.E. & sailing
E.N.E. the King in sight to the North at
8 P.M. left the ship sail & took in the main
sail the latter all sail set heading N.W. & S.
and a Bark a head so end with the latter
weather Lat 32.58 Long 174.07 E.

Sunday Feb 15th 1846

Begins with fine weather and heading N.W.
and a Bark of the Weather Realties and
the morning was 18 miles of the Weather
Bore the latter part calm and the bark
a stern so end.

Lat 32.15 Long 173.45 E

Monday Feb 16th 1846

Begins with calm weather and clear &
sailing N.E. & a Bark in sight at 8 P.M.
the middle part calm and say nothing of
note Lat 32.08 Long 175.30 E

Tuesday Feb 17th 1846

Begins with calm weather the middle part
a breeze from N.E. & sailing N.E. at 5
P.M. saw sperm whale and several god-fish
to one of the men drew and the weather very
bad so end in chase of the whales the wind
blowing strong and a bad sea.

Lat 32.08 Long 175.30 E

Wednesday Feb 18th 1846

Begins with strong winds from the North
and in chase of the whales and at 12
drew from one of the other the line parted and
at 8 P.M. came on board & had one boat upset
& one man and one whale out of three
so end sail this very hard luck to day
the latter part strong winds from S.W. and
chase.

Lat 32.11 Long 175.11 E
