Tuesday March 3rd 1845

Begins with fine weather and employed a
stowing down till the latter part the same
and saw nothing of note so ended

Lat 32° 00' S Long 179° 50' W

Wednesday March 4th 1845

Begins with fresh breezes and employed
stowing down till at 4 P.M. spoke the
Sailed from N.B. 1800 Bound to the N.W.
at 8 P.M. stowing down the latter
strong wind from N.W. and saw nothing
of note Lat 31° 45' S Long 179° 55' W

Thursday March 5th 1845

Begins with strong gale at 4 took in the
Main & Mizzen Top Sails the weather being the
Middle and latter part blowing heavy and
lying to weather S.E. so ended

Lat 32° 05' S Long 179° 40' W

Friday March 6th 1845

Begins with strong gale from S.E. & W.
lying to the Middle & latter moderate
& latter the wind S.W. Lat 32° 08' S

Long 179° 20' W

Saturday March 7th 1845

Begins with strong gale from S.W. & lying
to wind close reefed Main Top Sail & Fore Sail
at 3 P.M. saw a school of sperm whales all
around the ship & several 2 boats & 2 boats
but could not get on for they had seen the
ship at 3 P.M. and were bound to land the Fore
Sail & braced it when it was split in the
act of hauling it up the latter part strong
wind and employed mending the Mizzen
Top Sail and so ended

Sunday March 8th 1845

Begins with strong gale from S.W. & W.
heading to the South E. at 8 P.M. took in
Sail & rose ship to the S. the latter part heading
to the South under whole Top Sail & a fresh breeze from
W.S.W. so ended Lat 32° 55' S Long 179° 50' W

Monday March 9th 1845

Begins with strong breezes from N.W. & W.
heading S at 4 P.M. took in sail and rose
ship to the N.W. the Middle & latter part
strong breezes Lat 32° 00' S Long 179° 40' W

Tuesday March 10th 1845

Begins with strong breezes from the S
and heading to the Westward the Middle
and from S. & latter light breezes from
S.E. and heading to the N.W. so ended
the 24 hours Lat 32° 05' S Long 179° 00' W

Wednesday March 11th 1845

Begins with fresh breezes from the N
and heading N.W. at 4 P.M. saw a
ship & a whaling at 7 spoke the ship
of Fishery 22 months out 2400 3500
& wanting one whale to fill the Middle
& caught a hump back from the north the
latter part the same and under storm till
the 2nd in sight Lat 32° 05' S Long

Thursday March 12th 1845

Begins with a heavy gale from the North and
heading to the N.E. the Middle a new sea
on latter part moderated some and the wind
held to the Northward and the Company ship
in sight Lat

Friday March 13th 1845

Begins with fresh wind from S.W. & W. heading
N.W. & W. & Fore & Mizzen Top Sail set at 8 P.M. spoke
a put 2000 on board the Whaler of Fishery the
latter part fine weather and sail in sight to the
Westward Lat 31° 55' S Long 179° 50' W
