Thursday April 30th 1846

Begins with light breeze from W. and heading
to the N. W. at 3 P.M. took in sail at 5 P.M.
got ready to stow down but the weather being
and did not latter part heavy rain & wind
Lat 32° 10' S Long 178° 10' E

Friday May 1st 1846

Begins with ~~fine~~ weather the Middle fine
at 6 P.M. some stowing down at 10 P.M.
from rain and quite for the day it
raining very heavy the wind from the N.W.
so much Lat 32° 30' S Long 179° 00' E

Saturday May 2nd 1846

Begins with heavy rain wind from N.W.
the Middle part fair at 10 P.M. went to stow
down the weather fine so much that 24 hours
we saw nothing Lat 32° 40' S Long 179° 10' E

Sunday May 3rd 1846

Begins with fine weather & stowing down
the Middle part the same at 10 P.M. finished
stowing down so much Lat 32° 40' S Long 179° 10' E

Monday May 4th 1846

Begins with fresh breeze from S.W. and
clear weather and saw a Bark to windward
a cutter to windward at 6 P.M. took in
sail for the night the latter part fine and
breeze employed about ships duty so much
then 24 hours Lat 31° 55' S Long 178° 00' E

Tuesday May 5th 1846

Begins with light breeze from the S.W.
and heading over the ground latter part
fine and employed mending a main top sail
so much

Wednesday May 6th 1846

Begins with fine weather and at 6 P.M. lost
another main top sail the latter part strong winds
and one sail in sight Lat 32° 20' S Long 178° 15' E

Thursday May 7th 1846

Begins with strong gale from the N.W. East
and here to Middle heavy gales and rain
& main top sail in the latter part moderate rain &
at main top sail & fore sail so much that 24
hours Lat 32° 21' S Long 179° 10' E

Friday May 8th 1846

Begins with fresh gale and clear weather
& heading W. under short sail the Middle &
latter part heavy gale and the wind N.W.
employed a mending main top sail so much
a ship under our lee a bark

Lat 32° 08' S Long 179° 08' E

Saturday May 9th 1846

Begins with strong gales from N.W. W.
and under short sail at 5 P.M. spoke
the Charles of R. Bedford 400 tons of oil
the Middle and latter part heavy gales
and main top sail in Lat 32° 00' S Long 179° 10' E

Sunday May 10th 1846

Begins with heavy gales from S.W.
and under short sails the Middle &
latter very heavy and a high sea
so much that 34 hours Lat 32° 20' S
Long 179° 40' E

Monday May 11th 1846

Begins with heavy gales from S.W.
& heading S.W. the Middle and
latter part blowing very heavy and a high
sea on so much Lat 32° 42' S Long 178° 40' E

Tuesday May 12th 1846

Begins with strong gales from N.W. W.
and heading to the South at 3 P.M.
lost the Bow Boat the sand being
back the Middle & latter the same
and the Waikato boats sailed through
we got Tahiti to be so much
Lat 32° 05' S Long 178° 40' E
