

C. W. Morgan off French Rock West Longitude
Wednesday May 13th 1848

Begins with very heavy gale from
S.W. & headwinds to the S.E. and then
at 4 P.M. put her before the wind with
close reef fore & main top-sails & fore sail
standing S.E. by E. the latter part blowing
strong and a high sea Lat 52.10 Long 17.40 W

Thursday May 14th 1848

Begins with strong gales from S.W.
& steering S.E. by E. at 4 P.M. more
moderate at 8 took in sail part the night
& left to the Westward at 8 P.M.
made sail heading to the North East
& employed a fitting the boat

Lat 51.40 Long 17.40 W

French Rock Friday May 15th 1848

Begins with fine weather and heading
to the N. Eastward at 1 P.M. saw a
great many whales & several got near
5 gone up the chase and took up
the boat & took in sail for the night
heading S.E. the middle fin at 10 P.M.
made the coast rocks & Guy Island bearing
N.W. & made. Lat 30.30 Long 17.23 W

Saturday May 16th 1848

Begins with fine weather wind S.W. and
the rocks in sight at 4 P.M. were ship
& steering S.E. at 5 took in sail for the
night the middle and latter the same and
breking over the ground Lat 31.05 Long 17.40 W

Sunday May 17th 1848

Begins with fresh breeze from W. & heading
to the S.E. the middle & latter part moderate
breeze from W. to S.E. and saw nothing of
note so ended & heading to the S.E.

C. W. Morgan Round North West Longitude
Monday May 18th 1848

Begins with light airs from S.W. and
heading S.E. at 8 P.M. shortened sail
and the middle fin at 10 P.M. spoke
the Mizen of N.S. Bradford 3450 lbs of oil
450 of S. & the weather fine wind S.E. and sent
up fore & mizen top-sails & yard so ends in
company with the Mizen Lat 29.36 Long 17.43 W

Tuesday May 19th 1848

Begins with fine breeze from S.E. & pleasant
weather & heading S.E. in company with the
Mizen the middle & latter part fine at 8
& W sent the main sail so ends heading
S.W. employed at work on rigging & end
this day no whales Lat 28.51 Long 17.40 W

Wednesday May 20th 1848

Begins with light breeze from the Eastward
& heading to the North & employed at work
on the rigging the middle & latter part the same
& heading S.E. by E. Lat 28.51 Long 17.40 W

Thursday May 21th 1848

Begins with strong wind from S.E. and rain
at 5 P.M. put her to double reef main top-sail
& fore-sail it blowing a gale at 9 all barrels
called to take them in it blowing very heavy
the latter part wind held to S.E. and steering S.W. by E.
under short sail Lat 22.30 Long 17.40 W

Friday May 22th 1848

Begins with strong wind from S.E. and
steering S.W. at 5 P.M. took in sail and
left to heading S.E. & the latter part fine &
sent out the fly jib boom so ends

Lat 32.40 Long 17.51 W

Saturday May 23th 1848

Begins with fine weather and the middle &
latter part light airs from S. to W. and working
to the North so ends. Lat 26.10 Long 17.51 W
