Remarks Tuesday March 23rd 1852

P.M. Light breeze and cloudy weather

Employed scraping the studding sail
booms

A great quantity of fish have been
round the vessel the last few days of which
we catch all we require

A.M. The wind still continues to blow
from the S.E. a light breeze with cloudy
weather. Course made E.N.E.

Concludes with cloudy weather no observation

Remarks Wednesday March 24th 1852

P.M. Commences with light air and
cloudy weather

Employed as yesterday scraping and
painting the studding sail booms and
various other jobs

A.M. Wind and weather as usual

At 5 tacked to the Southward

crew variously employed

Latitude by Observation $1^{\circ} 39' S$

Longitude by Chronometer $85^{\circ} 45' W$

towards Taota

Remarks Thursday March 25th 1852

P.M. Light winds and cloudy

At 3 the wind suddenly shifted to the
N.W. a fresh breeze accompanied with
heavy rain. Course S.E. by E.

A.M. Commences with light variable winds
and cloudy weather At 2 1/2 3 am the wind
shifted to the S.E. braced the yards sharp
up on the starboard tack At 7 tacked
At noon tacked to the Southward.

Latitude by Observation $1^{\circ} 30' S$

Longitude by Chronometer $85^{\circ} 9' W$

Remarks Friday March 26th 1852

Commences with fresh breeze and cloudy
weather

Employed scraping the topsail boom
and other necessary work

A.M. Fresh breezes and and cloudy
all sail set by the wind

Employed cleaning the gun &c.

making S.W. by S course by compass

Latitude by Observation $2^{\circ} 48' S$

Longitude by Chronometer $86^{\circ} 49' W$
