Wednesday
July 28th Strong winds from N^W & clear -
Cruising near St Lawrence Bay -
several ships in sight.

Thursday 29th Strong winds & good weather - 8 sails
in sight - beating up towards
East Cape.
Lat 65 37.

Friday 30th Light winds from N^W & calms till 10
A.M. then a strong breeze from S^W
7 A.M. turned for a S.W. head channel
by the Meunier's boats did not see
him after entering. 4 A.M. turned
for another with the same result.
M^{rs} East Cape but N. 8 miles. Several
ships in sight all bound in to the Arctic.

Saturday 31st All day wind S^W part of the
time strong, steering to the N.W.
7 ships in company. Jamed with
Brasanza. Takah. Saw plenty of
M^{rs} Diggins - appeared for top gallant.

Sunday Aug 1st Moderate winds from N. & foggy
7 A.M. stood N.E. by E. 9 A.M.
fog lifted - saw 3 ships & "M. Diggins"

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In Arctic Ocean Aug 1838

Monday Aug 2nd 1838 Moderate winds from N.W.
& N.E. - steering to the N.E. 4 P.M.
spoke ship Japan nothing. saw also
Syke 2 wh. spoke also bark Baltic
Cutting a S.W. head making 2 this
sailing. - 9 A.M. Capt Bryant from
ship America boarded us for an hour
3 other sails in sight - saw Diggins
150 strokes per 24 hours

Tuesday 3rd All day moderate winds from N.E.
same rain - working to the N.E. at
7 A.M. kept off & stood S. & S.W. till
11 A.M. then came to the wind with head
yards aback - 250 strokes this day.
thick fog.

Wednesday 4th All day light winds from E^W & calms
raining steering by the wind to the N^W
all sails set. thick fog. saw one
ship. -

Thursday 5th All day moderate winds from N. with
spells of fog. 4 P.M. spoke ship Crimea
nothing - Majestic 3 wh. M. & Lacer
part fresh breeze from N.E. & some fog.
Broke out M. hatchway & cooped some
oil - spoke ship America - steering by
the wind to the E^W under topsails &
Cours. - 250 strokes per 24 hours.
