

## Logue Blaise At St Helena.

Monday April 21<sup>st</sup>

Employed in stowing the cedar and match on Libby.

Tuesday April 22<sup>nd</sup>

Employed in stowing off the ship and getting ready for sea. Found that three of the Portuguese sailors had deserted, viz. Henry Cooke, Charles Jones, and Frank Salera. Mistrustful some of the others so put two in irons.

Wednesday April 23<sup>rd</sup>

Employed in getting stores on board and getting ready for sea. Little breeze and fine breeze, cleared East night.

Thursday April 24<sup>th</sup>

Found this morning that the 3<sup>rd</sup> officer for Francis Abel Machado, Galician, & Antonio Truter and three natives of Brazil had deserted, by swimming overboard in the night. The natives names are:

Antonio Ferreira, Theodore Desai & Philip Delatille.

Friday April 25<sup>th</sup>

Commenced to leave us at 8 o'clock A.M. Found that the anchor was foul but broke one of the chains to the middle, got another from the hold, and got the anchor and left. The Captain staying on shore.

## Logue Blaise Off St Helena

Saturday April 26<sup>th</sup>

First part fine breeze from the S.E. on Starboard tack, by the wind, saw two whales in sight to windward. Middle and latter part fine light breeze.

Sunday April 27<sup>th</sup>

First part light air from the S.E. stored into the harbor, and got orders from the Capt. then stored off again by the wind on Starboard tack. Middle & latter part evening off on the island.

Monday April 28<sup>th</sup>

First part fine light breeze from the Eastward and pleasant and continued so throughout the day dying off in the evening.

Tuesday April 29<sup>th</sup>

First part fine breeze from the E. S.E. and pleasant. Middle part the same latter part light air and went down off the horn took one of my men and some provisions to the Cape, that they were caught in a fine state that the Capt. had taken them stored off again.

Wednesday April 30<sup>th</sup> 1879

First part fine breeze from the S.E. on Starboard tack, by the wind. Middle part nice breeze, still part fine breeze.
