166. L. for the Wind

First part. Light pleasant breeze and overcast, the clouds more heavy, bearing the resemblance of rain, the weather having more of a squally appearance.
Middle part. under short sail.
Latter part. light and pleasant, saw blackfish lower in truck tow the waste boat Enamie, saw the other the captain says he will not let us lower for blackfish again, because we did not get get more than one.
Left by Marion Oct. 14th 1835 L.

100 1898 1899

First part of light breeze and fine weather.
Middle part under short sail.
Latter part at a light made sail
and opposite tack, saw nothing of
the whale kind, variously employed
Lost by Warrant Oct. 23 S.

1860

First part light and very fine
