Remarks On Board Thursday 17th April 1846
Will part of these 24 hours thick heavy weather under Double Reef wind East
Course N by E Middle part wind S E under single Reefs latter wind hauled to the
East Course same all Rest set
Long 177° 14' East Lat by G^o 31° 01' South

Remarks On Board Friday 18th April
First part of these 24 strong bracks from the East Course N. by E. all sail set
at Sunflower took in M. & S. P. & L. and Double Reef. All the sails Middle parts took
in sail with fresh squalls at 3 & 4 M. wore ship to the Port & past 4 wore to the North
and made sail at 6 & 8 M. set Main & S. Sail Course N. by E. at 9 & 10 M. made the
Island of Myzolla bearing E by N distant 20 Miles Course N. saw lower Island
Long by Island Lat by Obs 18° 44' South

Remarks On Board Saturday 19th April
First part of these 24 hours very strong trades under single reefed sail. On T.G. Bell
Came off W. at 1 saw the Island of Ambow at 4 past 6 of the AM and distant 10 m.
huffed too off shore to the S under close reefed (main top sail and fore sail Ambow
bearing off W & under High Island & outside port actually with rain falling parts before
tail steering at 4 1/2 a.m. rained the S. distant 10 m. under High Island & fore at 5 1/2 a.m.
distant 10 miles fair weather all sail set steering along the Reef
Left by 17:39 South

Remarks On Board Sunday 20th April
Left port of these 24 hours light wind from the East & blowing for West Island
at 2 hour it at sundown bore at distant 12 miles and High Island bore S by E 1/2 E
distant 12 miles doublet kept the 1st sail and wore ship to the S W. Middle part of day
off and one of the Island at daylight Moderate breezes standing for Western Island at
No A M the natives came on board and traded Yams
Left by 10 17009 P.M.

Remarks On Board Monday 21st April
First part of these 24 hours all sail set standing to the S.E. at sundown Moderate winds
from the S.E. Western Island bore S. by W. distant 10 miles the other lands from S.E. to E. & E.
Middle parts calm and fine breezes latter parts brisk breezes from the S.E. by E strong full
and by the land in sight
Long 178° 08' East Lat by Obs 16° 17' South

Remarks On Board Tuesday 22^d April
First part of these 24 hours very strong breezes from the S.E. by the wind & S.E.
swell blew the Fore M Mast failed the small blades in sight at Sea down bore S.E. & I
Middle part laying with the land latter part shuffling off and on as the wind
permitted employed at breaking out of Sloop and water
Long 178° 39' East Lat 16° 09' South

Remarks On Board Wednesday 23 April
First part of these 24 hours fresh breezes from the S.E. blowing along the coast to the S. at sundown West end Nov. 9 by us the Cape Island bore S.W. & distant 18 miles (middle part of day latter same blowing up to the North point of the Island saw several Canoes
Long 177° 45' East Left by Oct 16 72

 Remarks On Board Thursday 24th April 1845
 First part of these 24 hours fresh breeze from the east all sail set beating up along
 the reef at sundown the E & E point of Sachanova bearing S & E and the E & S Bled 106.8
 laying off Howe Middle parts tacking off on latter parts strong trades from the E by S
 Doubled Reefed Off sails took in at 10 o'clock and made sail
 Long by Land 179° 23 East Long by 179° 52 East by Chron. Lat by Obs 16° 04 S

Remarks On Board Sunday 25th April.
 The first part of these 24 hours strong trades under Doubled Rigs. Cruising off the Bar at
 sundown the reef 1 mile off Head of Stone Middle and latter part strong trades under 2 reef.
 Off Paile depending off land on cruising repairing fore sail
 Call by Oiler 1612 South

Remarks On Board Saturday 26th April
First part of this 24 hours strong trades blowing on each side of the reef with frequent
famed battering parts but the main part of the and flacker-battering off and on
Left by the 16th Port

Remarks On Board Sunday 24th April
First haul of line 24 hours strong trawls under South West light at sandown took off three
fish, viz. p. & s. and shrimps and three fish. Mackerel and 1000 fish. More mackerel
trawling to and for all fish but saw well. Island in sight. Tackmanover land. Lower 3 far West
Day 179th 54 East Lat 34° 16' 10 South

Remarks On Board Monday 25th April
First part of these 24 hours light breezes from the E & E at sundown shortens sail
hauling up fore mast & after mast & hoist all sail out employed at repairing sails
Lat 14° 07' South

Remarks On Board Tuesday 29th April
 A part of the 24 hours light wind from the North & Curdoun. Shortened sail standing
 at three middle parts rain. Hatter parts fine weather with light air from the N.E.
 employed at weighing sails

Remarks On Board Wednesday 20th April
 6th part of these 24 hours nearly calm but 12 miles off Middle part calm and rainy
 latter half calm but having a good wind S.E. at 11 A.M. saw 3 breeches in the
 reef 5 miles off. 10 knots after 24 hours strong breeze

1. Remarks On Board Thursday 1st May
First part of these 24 hours strong trades at 1 P M veiled whales & whales from the
ship. Hoveed 3 boats and fastened to the Starboard Boat and got the line cut or bit
off fastened again and drewd fastener to the Starboard and hoist. Boats and took them
alongside at 4 P M at 6 got them in Doubled Reef the 3rd Boats and stood to
the E N E Middle part of line ready for Boiling and getting Boats latter part Boiling
and got all clear (Ref. 14 miles off) 9-13 9-13

Remarks on 24th April Friday 2nd [redacted]
First part of these 24 hours spent under Double Reef, tacking on each Tack Working
Middle part finish of Baiting (after part chased off and washed off, showing
beads from the C.P.E. under Double Reef) Top Sails and Courses beating, up to the
weather of the passage standing off shore about 24 miles and so in
