April 1852

At 6 set the gills and mainsail Middle part
more moderate turned a reef out of
the top sails latter part strong from
N.E. by E steering N.W. by E under sin-
gle reefed topsails and courses sent down
the main topsail to repair at 12 o'clock I
left bent it. George blanch complain-
ing with a Port fever so ends

commenced with fine breeze from N.E. breeze
N.W. by E under single reefed topsails and
courses employed at breaking out the
main hatch for corn water flour and
meal turned up the waist boat to
paint the Stearage box has been unfortunate
enough to catch the Port fever Middle part
light winds from the Eastward steering N by E
under all sail latter part wind and sea has
the same saw sail in the morning to the East
ward at 4 P.M. set in thick fog employed
at a little of every thing Killed 3 Fish

Lat 31° 00' D.R.
Long 166° 10'

commenced with light winds and thick
fog steering N by W under all sail
Middle part the same breeze N by W Lat 31°
Port wind and weather the same saw Albatross
employed at peeling the blubber room Got 2
observations

Friday
23

Lat 32° 10'
Long 166° 30'

commenced with light airs from the N
orthward with thick fog steering by the
wind heading N.W. under all sail
Middle part the hauled to the Eastward
very light breeze N.E. by E the fog
still holds as thick as ever latter part
the same employed at grinding
Cruet I then for the Subboard water
completing with the Port Leper

Long 164° 10'

No observations
commenced with light winds from
the Eastward with thick fog steering
N by W employed at a little of
every thing for to Kill time which
to get on base water in fog weather

Middle part strong breeze latter part
the same under topsails and courses
employed at sending in the fly gill
breeze Weather clear got a sight at
179 the sun at Noon Lat 36° 29'

Monday
25

Long 167° 00'

commenced with strong breeze from
the Eastward steering N.E. by E under
the main top gallant sail turned off
the bow boat to repair where she was
stove in Port Kille 3 Hogs all we
have The thermometer stands at
64 degrees in the cabin Middle part
winds moderate made all sail bourse at
last part the same saw finbacks and

Tuesday
26

Lat 38° 30'
Long 166° 37'

commenced with fine breeze from S.E.
steering N under all sail saw nothing of
the whale spies And no birds more than one very
small one So commenced Monday the second day
of the week Middle part light winds from
the Southward steering N.E. by E at 5 P.M.
set in thick fog And continued the
remainder of the day employed at making
bone scrapers and shortening the fore topsail
sheets so as to have them go with a whip
Got 2 observations And saw nothing

Wednesday
27

Lat by D.R. 40° 30'
Long 166° 10' 71'

commenced with fine breeze from S.W.
steering N.E. by E under all sail The fog
still continues as thick as ever
set up the cabin stove The Thermom-
eter stands at 64 degrees All Hands
in good health Middle and latter part the same
employed at nothing

Thursday
28

Lat 43° 00'
Long 166° 00'

commenced with fine breeze from S.W. steering
N.E. by E under all sail Middle part strong
breeze at 2 o'clock I left hauled N by E
top gallant sails at 3. reefed the main tops
at 6 doubled reefed the fore and main
at 8 more moderate turned one reef out
of the main topsail wind N by W steer
ing by the wind heading N.E. weather clear
saw finbacks employed at breaking out blubber
