

Ship Com. Morris of New Bedford

Sunday June 25th

Comes in with strong gales from S.W. and squally weather - Ship steering to E by S with all prudent sail out. for P. Flores. Byones saw several sail steering to the E. - saw one school of Blackfish and plenty of eddies all night blowing a heavy gale from S.W. hove ship too at 1 A.M. Lat. at merid 39.40
16° 00' for Long.

Monday June 26th

Comes in with a heavy gale from S.W. hauling to W and N.W. with a very heavy sheet. Choppy sea on. - ship lying very much indeed. At 8 wind changed to the N. made all prudent sail and kept ship E. S. E. wind hauled to the S.W. then S. E. and then E from which quarter it blowed steadily until 10 P.M. then hauled suddenly to the S.W. blowing fresh all night

Tuesday June 27th

Comes in with steady breezes from S.W. and cloudy weather - ship steering S. E. with all sail out - nothing in sight all day. In the P.M. squally weather. Turner went forward and Ballard Lat at merid 39.15
came aft in the cabin Long by Chron. 45.50

Wednesday June 28th

Comes in with fresh breezes from the W. and heavy weather - ship steering E. by S with all sail out - nothing in sight all day - watch employed about ship as usual
Lat at merid 39.30
Long by Chron. 42.40

Thursday June 29th

Comes in with moderate breezes from the N.W. and fine pleasant weather - ship steering E. S. E. with all sail out. - nothing in sight all day - watch employed in repairing maintopsail - ship working toward Flores
Lat at merid 39.45
Long by Chron. 40.00

Friday June 30th

Begins with moderate breezes from the N.W. and somewhat foggy all day, but by spells when it would be quite clear - saw several finbacks and one or two humpbacks - watch employed in repairing maintopsail
Lat at merid 39.35
Long by Chron. 39.40

Saturday July 1st

Begins with light fair from N. E. and quite good weather although some cloudy - ship by the wind to the E. S. E. and S. E. with all sail but foretopgall sail out. - saw several finbacks and in the P.M. saw two sail, both steering to the N.W. - one we call a whaler as she had no foretopgall sail or gaff topsail set. - she had fore royal yard aloft. - finished the main topsail and bent it - saw porpoises jellies bottle drops and a few bad stools - good indications of whales
Lat at merid 39.50
Long by Chron. 37.00

Sunday July 2nd

all day light air and calm - ship steering E. S. E. with all sail out. - nothing in sight but one or two finbacks - plenty of jellies and bottle drops in the water
Lat at merid 39.53
Long by Chron. 35.50
