

Monday June 17th 1872

All day light breezes from the S. S. W. and fine pleasant weather. Ship steering to the E. by S with all sail out cruising for sperm whales. - seen nothing all day but three sail one steering to the E. S. E. and the others to the S. E. - Saw a few jillies & Vallow Drop & C in the water today

Tuesday June 18th 1872

All day fine pleasant weather and mod. breezes from the South. Ship steering E. by S with all sail out in a cruise to the N. E. - Nothing in sight all day

Wednesday June 19th 1872

All day fine pleasant weather and moderate breezes from the S. W. - Ship cruising to the E. S. E. with all sail out. Nothing in sight but one sail. Saw but little indications of whales. Lat. 32.22 Long 54.06

Thursday June 20th 1872

All day light moderate breezes from the S. and fine weather. Ship steering E. all day with all sail out. Two sail in sight in the A. M. at 8 spoke Bk Wave Briggs seven days from Bermuda no report of oil. Gammed with her both ships steering to the E. - Nothing more in sight. Lat 32.19 Long 57.40

Friday June 21st 1872

All day light breezes from the South and fine pleasant weather. Ship steering E. with all sail out cruising. Bk Wave in sight in the A. M. at 4 P. M. picked up an empty water cask. Nothing more in sight. Lat 32.00 Long 49.40

Saturday June 22nd 1872

All day light breezes from all points of the compass and calm. at 4 P. M. took a light breeze from the N. - Ship working to the E. S. E. with all sail out. Nothing in sight all day. Lat 32.30 Long 48.37

Sunday June 23

Comes in with light airs and calm nothing in sight all day. Lat 33.30 Long 48.17

Monday June 24th 1872

Comes in with light airs from the S. E. and E. with fine pleasant weather. Ship by the wind to the S. E. with all sail out. Two sail in sight both steering to the S. E. at 10 A. M. raised what we called to sail ahead. at 12 called her a steamer. at 2 concluded she was a wreck. and accordingly sent away two boats and in a short time sent another. Saw one sail steering for her. - boarded her about 4 P. M. and found a boat from the sail on the weather beam - an Atlantic Bark - in possession. The wreck proved to be the Bk Mozart of Windsor a very Scotch with hard Pine Timber. Water logged and partially dismantled. all the lower masts were entire. mainmast gone. Some attempt had apparently been made to get her into port as she had a temporary gibber flying boom and also several spars on board. parties had been on board and stripped her of sails and rigging. We found the crew of the Atlantic Bk. very busy. and we accordingly went in for old junk. She had two splenetic chains and anchors. Lat 34.00 Long 47.40
