

Wednesday Oct. 16th 1872

All day strong breezes from S.E. and clear weather. Ship steering S.S.W. per compass with all sails out. After the Cape de Verde - In the P.M. carried away in a small squall the foretopmast studding sail boom - sent in down, spliced and sent it up again and set the topmast and lower studding sails - Nothing in sight all day

Thursday Oct. 17th 1872

All day fresh breezes from S.E. and some squalls of rain. Ship steering S by W with all sail out for the South Atlantic. Nothing in sight all day.

Friday Oct. 18th 1872

All day light baffling winds from the S.E. and quite fine weather but some squalls of rain. Ship steering S by W with all sail out. - One sail in sight in the morn steering to the W. all day employed in setting up Dack for Oil between decks.

Saturday Oct. 19th 1872

All day light baffling winds from all points of the compass but mostly from S.E. and some small showers of rain. Ship steering to the S. with all sail out. - Nothing in sight but one sail seen during the night and a few birds water being a good color for whales.

Sunday Oct. 20th 1872

First part light baffling airs from all points with small showers of rain. Ship steering S. with all sail but studding sails out. - at 10 A.M. took a light steady breeze from the E. - Saw one sail steering to the S.W. Nothing more in sight. All day

Monday Oct. 21th 1872

All day moderate trades from S.E. and fine weather. Ship steering S.S.W. with all sail out for the Isle of Brava. - Nothing of note taking place during the day.

Tuesday Oct. 22^d 1872

All day strong breezes from S.E. regular trades and fine weather. Ship steering to the S.S.W. with all sail out studding sails included - nothing but three sail in sight all day.

Wednesday Oct. 23^d 1872

All this day from three o'clock A.M. lay becalmed under the lee of the Island of St. Antao, about 5 or 6 miles from the land. - Saw quite a number of birds some two or three schools of porpoises and some jellies and other indications of whales. at 6 P.M. took a strong breeze from the E. which caused us to double reefed the top sails. Ship steering for Brava. Several vessels passed us to the leeward with strong trades while we were becalmed under the land.
