

Monday Monday Mar, 10th 1873
 All this day light buffling winds & calms
 ship working to the S. & E. with all sail out
 nothing in sight but one steamer bound to the
 N. E. and one sail vessel - very few birds
 no signs of whales
 Lat. 27.48
 Long. 47.20

Tuesday March 11th 1873
 All day light buffling winds from the E. & N. E.
 ship by the wind on different tacks working to
 the E. with all sail out - nothing in sight
 all day but a few birds some dolphins and
 two or three sharks
 Lat. 28.10
 Long. 47.00

Wednesday March 12th 1873
 All this day light breezes and pleasant weather from
 the E. & N. E. ship by the wind on different tacks
 cruising - nothing in sight all day but birds &
 dolphins - caught two

Thursday March 13th 1873
 All day light breezes from the E. & N. E. and over-
 cast with some rain - ship by the wind to
 the S. & E. with all prudent sail set - not-
 ing in sight all day - little or no signs of
 whales
 Lat. 28.45
 Long. 46.26

Friday March 14th 1873
 All day strong gales from N. E. and thick
 hazy weather - kept ship off S. W. by S.
 for the whaling ground off the River La Platte
 saw some birds through the day but no other
 signs of whales

Saturday March 15th 1873
 All day fine pleasant weather with moderate
 breeze from the S. W. - ship by the wind to the
 S. & E. with all sail out - in the A. M. saw
 one sail steering to the N. E. under easy sail
 but a very few birds today no fish or other
 indications of whales
 Lat. 34.30
 Long. 48.54

Sunday March 16th 1873
 All day light airs from the N. E. and fine pleas-
 ant weather - ship steering S. W. by S. with all
 sail out bound for the River La Platte whaling
 ground at 8 A. M. raised sperm whales
 coming quite quick from S. W. to the N. E. but
 soon milled before we could get our boats
 to them and went about south quick
 lowered three boats and chased but did not
 see them from the boats. Whales went out
 of sight to windward the last we saw them
 at about 11 A. M. boats returned on board
 at 2 P. M. nothing more in sight all
 day - ship working to the S. & W.
 Lat at merid. 34.38
 Long by chron. 49.00

Monday March 17th 1873
 All day light breezes from the N. E. and fine
 weather ship steering W. by S. with all sail
 out - saw several sail during the day all
 steering to the S. & W. - no signs of indicating
 of whales, but a very few birds, and nothing
 at all in the water - at 6 P. M. kept
 ship off to the S. by E. for Lat. 37.
 being as we calculate just on the edge of the
 Banks and in Lat. 35.00 S. a noted place
 for S. Whales
