Oct. 1864

332 Sunday 29th Come with light gales from N. at 3 P.M. four 3 Boats for a Whales at 5 P.M. took move along sea in the Dec at 6 P.M. commenced to cut Midale part fine pleasant weather at 9 P.M. finish cutting and run to the Eastward out of the Dec. Latter part light winds from the S to S.W. saw a few ships a whaling fine weather Herola Island bearing S.W. Lat 41° 40' N

333 Monday 30th Come with fine weather light winds from S. saw a number of whales 2 Ships a cutting but an chance to four spoke the B.K. P. M. Thompson 15 whales Midale 8 Latter part light winds from the S.W. fine pleasant weather and plenty of whales took 3 along side and commenced to cut and boil the Delancey in sight bearing S. distant 35 Miles 4 Ships Lat 41° 40' N Long 174° 40' W

334 Tuesday 1st Come with light winds from N.W. pleasant at 5 P.M. finish cutting 3 whales at 7 P.M. spoke the Norman 4 whales Midale part fresh wind from N.W. and very cold Latter part fresh wind from the N.W. all hands employed in storing oil up the fore Hatch Lat 41° 30' N

335 Wednesday 2nd Come with fresh gales from N.W. the ship is close to the Dec. Herola Island bearing S.W. all hands employed in storing oil Midale part wind and weather the same plenty of snow Latter part wind N.W. and light plenty of snow the ship on the Western tack under easy sail it very cold saw 4 ships Lat 41° 38' N

336 Thursday 3rd Come with light winds from N. the ship is by the Dec and no whales at 1 P.M. spoke the B.K. Massachusetts of San Francisco 8 whales it very cold plenty of snow Midale part the same Latter part wind light from N.W. and snow and heavy weather steering S.E. under short sail the wind fresh from N.W. and freezing weather at 9 A.M. lost sight of the Dec. Lat 40° 55' N Long 174° 30' W

337 Friday 4th Come with light gales from N. steering S.E. by compass at 5 P.M. luffed on the land 1000 tons at sun down the wind west the ship on the N. Western tack Midale part fresh Gale took in fore and Mizzen top sails the ship on the Southern tack Latter part the same all hands employed in storing oil Lat 40° 29' N

338 Saturday 5th Come with light gales from the N. and some snow squalls the ship on the S. tack all hands employed in storing oil at 6 P.M. finish Midale part fresh wind the ship on the opposite tack Latter part light winds from the N.W. the ship on Northern tack saw a number of ships in sight Lat 40° 26' N Long 173° 40' W

339 Sunday 6th Come with light winds from N.W. fine pleasant weather steering N.W. at 6 P.M. spoke the B.K. Joseph Maxwell 5 whales the season Midale part fresh wind from the N.E. steering N.W. Latter part the same some snow in squalls saw 11 ships the Dec in sight no sun
