Saw gunnasses weaving mats wind North Course S. E.
Lat by Ch 36.57. S. Lon by Chron 15.48. East

Wednesday March the 12th 1851. These last 24 hours pleasant
weather S.M. making mats. Broke out for pork and beef
in the after hold nothing in sight. S.M. West A.M.
moderate breezes and fine clear weather. Saw gunnasses
making gunny yarn and nailing mats. Steering S. E.
wind variable from south west to south by East
Lat by Ch 36.41. S. Lon by Chron 17.3. East

Thursday March the 13th 1851. These last 24 hours moderate
nothing sight at work on the fore rigging A.M. moderate
breezes and fine clear weather at work setting up the
headsails middle and a squall of rain steering all over the
Ocean nothing in sight. Course S. S. E. wind all around
Lat by Ch 36.58. S. Lon by Chron 18.48. East

Friday March the 14th 1851. These last 24 hours
moder breezes and calms. Saw a number of water sprouts
nothing going on P.M. and A.M. moderate breezes and pleasant
weather. Saw gunnasses. Course S. E. wind East sent down the
main sail and mended it and sent it up again
Lat by Ch 37.30. Lon by Chron 19.48. East

Saturday March the 15th 1851. These last 24 hours commenced
with strong breezes and pleasant with a heavy sea running
broke out for water in the fore hold saw porpoises at 4 m
sent down the fore top gallant yard A.M. the wind blowing
agala saw porpoises. under close reef top sails steering East
wind S. E. Lat by Ch 37.26. S. Lon by Chron 20.48. East

Sunday March the 16th 1851. These last 24 hours strong breezes
and typically with rain nothing in sight P.M. steering East
wind S. E. A.M. last part strong breezes and cloudy saw porpoises
wind S. E. steering by the wind nothing going on gunny mounds
Lat by Ch 37.48. Lon by Chron 21.38. East

Monday March the 17th 1851. These last 24 hours commenced
with strong breezes A.M. nothing in sight. Course East
wind S. E. A.M. strong breezes and cloudy saw porpoises wind
steering South course East by South. No other copper making buckets
Lat by Ch 38.10. S. Lon by Chron 22.28. East

Tuesday March the 18th 1851. These last 24 hours commenced
with moderate breezes and cloudy P.M. wind S. E. by South
Course East by South. A.M. saw gunnasses fresh gals and raising
nothing in sight. Course E. by S. wind S. E. nothing to be marked
S.M. Lat. Lon by Chron 22.30. East

Wednesday March the 19th 1851. These last 24 hours commenced
with moderate breezes and rainy nothing in sight nothing to be marked
through the day A.M. strong breezes with heavy squalls with rain
saw gunnasses and gunners steering E. S. East wind variable
at nine o'clock changed the foresail and close reef the main top sail
and sent down the main top gallant yard blowing
Lat by Ch. Lon by Chron 24.00. East agala n.
