

- Sunday 9 August 1868 These 24 hours begins with light winds from the Eastward and pleasant steering to the Westward through the Ice at dark tide up middle and latter part last saw a Polar Bear toward a boat and killed him So Ends
Lat by obs 61.43 N Long by Chron 81.04 W
- Monday 10 These 24 hours begins and ends with light winds from N.E. and pleasant working hard to get out of the Ice but bound up so that we could not move So Ends this day Lat by obs 61.51 N
- Tuesday 11 These 24 hours begins and ends with light winds from N.E. and pleasant in the Ice at 11 A.M. got out through the Ice at 11 A.M. got out through after a hard struggle So Ends
Lat by obs 61.59 N Long by Chron 82.30 W
- Wednesday 12 These 24 hours begins and ends with light winds from the South and pleasant steering N.W. with all sail out at 7 P.M. saw the last of the Ice So Ends
Lat by obs 61.51 N Long by Chron 84.33 W
- Thursday 13 These 24 hours begins with calm and fine weather at 6 P.M. light winds from the Southward steering N.W. middle and latter part the same with fog So Ends this day nothing in sight etc etc
- Friday 14 These 24 hours begins with light winds from the Southward with thick fog steering N.W. middle part much the same at 8 A.M. saw Cape Kendall bearing N.W. & dist 5 miles sounded 7 fathoms latter part light winds from the Southward and cloudy So Ends
Lat by obs 63.33 N Long none

- Saturday 15 August 1868 These 24 hours begins and ends with light winds from the Southward and heavy steering N.W. middle part much the same at 5 A.M. 1 mile Cape Kendall bearing N.W. & dist 15 miles at 9 A.M. passed Whale Point into Ross Welcome latter part much the same So Ends this day etc etc
- Sunday 16 These 24 hours begins with light winds from the S.E. and heavy steering up the Welcome middle part calm with fog latter part light air and clear So Ends
Lat by obs 65.01 N Long by Chron 86.05 W
- Monday 17 These 24 hours begins and ends with light winds from the Southward and pleasant steering up the Welcome into Repulse Bay So Ends So etc
- Tuesday 18 These 24 hours fine pleasant weather at 1 P.M. came to anchor in Island Harbor Repulse Bay in 16 fathoms of water found the Annel Gills there arrived the same day sent the boats out to look for Whales saw nothing So Ends
- Wednesday 19 These 24 hours fresh winds from the Southward with rain boats out looking for Whales at 2 P.M. winds hauled to N.W. and clears up saw two Whales So Ends this day
- Thursday 20 These 24 hours fresh gales from N.W. with snow squalls boats out looking for Whales saw three but without success So Ends
- Friday 21 These 24 hours fresh gales from N.W. with snow squalls boats off looking for Whales saw once middle and latter part same So Ends
- Saturday 22 These 24 hours begins with strong winds from the N.W. middle and latter part more moderate at Marsden wind hauled to S.E. So Ends
