An Excellent Pickle for Ham and Beef

I have used the Receipt for over 25 years for
Curing Ham & Beef, it leaves the Meat Sweet
and tender, and requires no presiding when Cooked,
I consider it all that is desirable for Curing
Ham and Beef, Water 4 gallons, Sugar or Molasses
12 Pounds, Saltpeter 2 ounces, Salt 6 Pounds, if
Coursed, if fine rather more, Boil all together
and skim, Pack the Meat in a Vessel and
pour the Pickle on Cold, Sufficient to Cover the
whole, Should remain in from two to four
weeks before Smoking, In Curing Beef I use
the same kind, or the same pickle will do,
if Scolded, by sprinkling the same amount of
Salt between the layers of beef as it requires
to make the pickle, As often as I skim
rides on the brine, it should be Scolded and
replaced on the beef Cold, By so doing Corned
beef will remain good late in the Summer,
When Ham are taken from the Smoke House and
before any flies come about, they should be
securely wrapped Separately in ^{old} newspaper
and tied up in a Glaze or some other bag and
hung or laid up in a Cool, dry place and by so
doing you may have good Ham during the
year.
