

Ship Courier of Dorchester from Boston cruising in the
Hoods. Remarks on board Thursday Nov 21st 1834

W. S. W. Commenced with fine weather
all hands employed in boiling
and storing down 4 part in pig fat
2 cutting and 4 in total in the
top of all good rails and red the watch
and hump backs

Middle part fresh breeze
all day light breeze in rigging
lower could not get for
one rail in right sailing

Latter part moderate rain
a whale lower could not strike
so ends this day all hands
employed in boiling

W. S. W. Remarks on board Friday Nov 22nd 1834
Commenced with fine weather
sun & single lower a good part
and huffed and 4 the rest being
to the ship and commenced
cutting and 6 finished and took
in rail & rail in right all
boiling

Middle part the same
all day light breeze all sail

Latter part light air
all hands employed in
boiling and storing down
a side this day 6 ships in sight
4 boiling off the ship of Hennes
of Newburgh with 8 whales

South Atlantic Ocean whaling Hoods Lovers Master 1834 Nov 26th

W. S. W. Remarks on board Saturday Nov 29th

Commenced with light air all
hands employed in boiling and storing
down a whale lower and
a good part of the ship
of Hennes with
4 whales and 8 in the
watch

S. W. Middle part calm
all day light 4 mil in sight
one sailing

Latter part foggy and breeze
all hands employed in boiling
spoke the ship of Hennes
of Newburgh all full lower
the ship of Hennes in sight
Capt. Tabor of the ship Triton left for
Lovers in the John Edwards week

W. S. W. Remarks on board Sunday Nov 30th 1834

Commenced with fine weather
all hands employed in boiling
down one whale and 6 in
finished boiling took in rail
and red the watch

Middle part fresh breeze and
foggy all day light breeze sail

Latter part fine weather
all hands employed in boiling
down one whale and 6 in
finished this day 8 ships in sight
