

Ship Courier from New Bedford towards the Pacific Ocean

Friday June 29th 1838

Commences with a moderate breeze from the South lying
of and on getting off vegetable, middle part much as
the first latter part light air & calm boat on shore for
Potatoes a ship in sight so ends

Saturday June 30th 1838

Commences with a light air from the S.W. at 2 P.M.
came off from the shore discharged the boat took her
up made fast on the ship off shore middle & latter
part calm saw Porpoises, the land about 30 miles distant
bearing N.E. a ship & two Schooners in sight so ends.

Sunday July 1st 1838

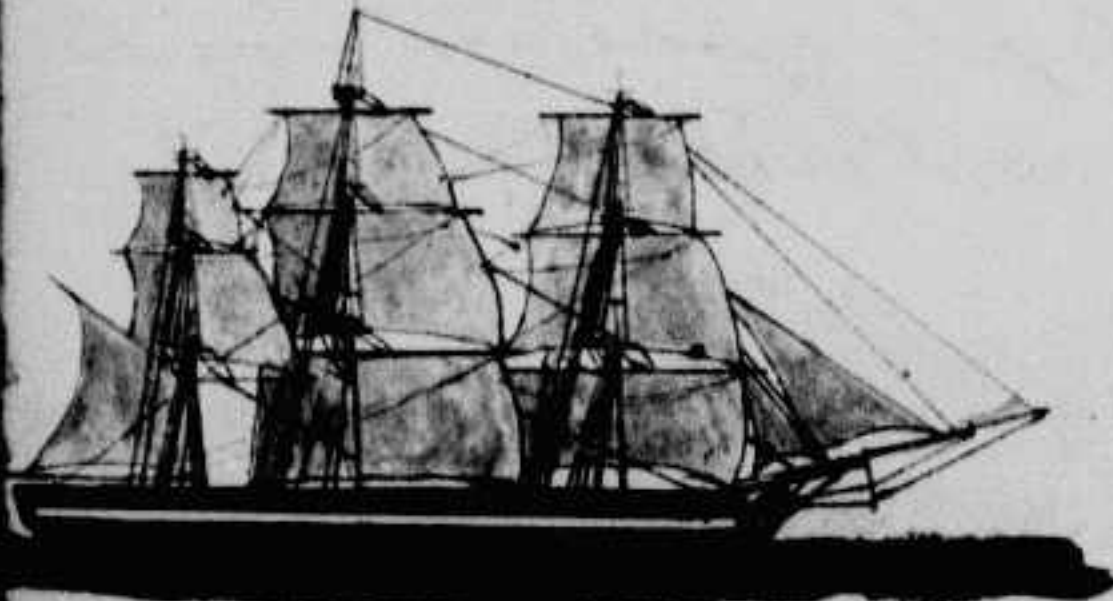
Commences with a calm at 4 P.M. took a breeze from the
Eastward stood to the South middle part light air & calm
with cloudy weather latter part much the same so ends
Flora in sight.

Monday July 2nd 1838

Commences with light air & calms with cloudy weather
standing to the Eastward middle part much the same
latter part a light breeze from the S.W. with cloudy
weather steering by the wind with the starboard tack
aboard so ends. Lat by Obs. 39° 24' North.

Tuesday July 3rd 1838

Commences with a moderate breeze from the S.W. with
fair weather steering by the wind to the South at 1 P.M. made
Rico the Peak bearing S.E. middle part very light air
steering S.E. latter part steering East Tazal Rico St. George
Traciosa & Ferreira in sight and 3 or 4 ships besides other small
craft so ends.



Wednesday July 4th 1838

Commences with a light breeze from the
Westward running down for Ferreira at 6 P.M.
spoke the Cadmus Fair Haven no Obs middle
steering by the wind at 6 till kept off S.E. at 9
spoke the Bark Maria New Bedford no Obs
saw a Bird so ends.

Ship Courier from New Bedford towards the Pacific Ocean

Thursday July 5th 1838

Commences with a fresh breeze from the Westward running
down past Ferreira at 3 P.M. shifted to the wind to the South
middle part moderate breeze from the S.W. steering by the
wind with the starboard tack aboard late part wind from
the W.S.W. to West. the watch employed hauling up the
Chains and putting one of them down in the fore hold to
trim ship so ends. Lat by Obs. 35° 53' Long by Obs. 25° 52' West

Friday July 6th 1838

Commences with a moderate breeze from the Westward with
fair weather steering by the wind with the starboard tack
aboard middle part much the same latter part wind from
the South standing to the Westward a ship in sight to the
South of us so ends. Lat by Obs. 35° 00' North

Saturday July 7th 1838

Commences with a light air from the S.W. steering by the wind with the
starboard tack aboard at 4 P.M. tacked to the S.E. middle &
latter part moderate breeze & fine pleasant weather saw a great
many Porpoises so ends. Lat by Obs. 35° 11' Long by Obs. 24° 58'

Sunday July 8th 1838

Commences with a very moderate breeze from the S.W. with fair weather steering
by the wind with the starboard tack aboard at 5 P.M. spoke the Ship
Com^{rs} Perry of New London 27 days out had landed 29 lbs of Sp
oil at Tazal. middle part much as the first at 4 P.M. tacked
at 11 tacked back so ends. Lat by Obs. 34° 32' North



Monday July 9th 1838

Commences with a fresh breeze from the South with fair
weather at 2 P.M. tacked to the Westward at 4 P.M. the wing hauled to the
S.W. tacked to the S.E. middle and latter part wind from S.W.
to S.W. variously employed so ends. Lat by Obs. 33° 44' Long by Obs. 23° 50' West
