Friday, the 11

This day begins with heavy weather ship hove to with storm sails set. There is also a very heavy sea running. Middle part began to moderate gradually. Latter part quite moderate. The Barometer has risen a considerable amount. At end of the day Lat 44.22 Long 40.27 West



Sat 12 This day begins with the wind from the West ship making good time. See three different Ice Bergs very large ones also see Blackfish middle part strong breeze latter part more moderate again. Lat 49.05 Long 39.11 West

Sunday 13. This day begins with moderate breeze from the West ship steering S.W. by E. See 10 ten large Ice Bergs to day and the weather has been foggy all day. At sundown very foggy and so shorten sail and hove to. Ship two did not dare to run no observation

Mon 14 This day begins with moderate breeze from the North middle part began to thicken up around see lots of large Ice Bergs at 3.30 the mail to the West and breezing on with rain at sundown haled the ship aback under lower top sail & lost reef mainsail.

At Sun. or observation Judge the Island to be about 90 miles distant bearing N. by East

Tues 15. This day begins with heavy weather wind changed to the S.W. met. rose ship around on the Starboard tack and placed the yard forward see lots of very large Ice Bergs in sight from the ship deck. and the weather not very clear at 11.30 A.M. raised the Island of North Seagee straight ahead of the ship 30 miles off. At sundown ship hove to. The land was backed the ship around heading off shore. wind blowing strong all day from the S.W. At end of the day Lat 52.54 S Long 36.25 W



Wed 16. This day begins with strong winds from the West ship working to the windward under short sail the wack buoy getting the chains up and anchors ready to use middle part the wind moderated so set all sail. at 6.30 P.M. anchored the ship in Cumberland Bay in 25 fathoms of water with the heavy anchor. weather moderate. furled the sail and set the wack lots of Ice Bergs in sight

Thurs 17. This day begins with fine weather. wind light from the S.W. (1) hove the anchor up and made sail and beat the ship up into the better part of the harbor and anchor the ship with three anchors. ship laying in Cumberland Bay.
