Remarks on Board Sunday Sept. 8th.

Comes in with light winds from S.W. and fine weather. Ship by the wind to the S. with all sail out cruising toward the Azores. Saw through the day several schools of porpoises, 2 sails steering to the E. Water very Blue and full of Yellow Drops and jellies.

at 2 P.M. tacked ship to the W.N.W.

Lat. 43.43 N. Long. by Cal. 22.30 W.

Monday Sept. 9th 1878

Comes in with fine pleasant weather with the winds from the S.W. Ship by the wind to the S. until 2 P.M. when tacked to the W.N.W. with all sail out cruising. Saw two sails and several schools of porpoises through the day.

Tuesday Sept. 10th 1878

Comes in with light breezes from the S. and fine weather. Ship by the wind to the W. with all sail out. One sail in sight steering to the E. with the appearance of being under full mast. Saw through the day several schools of porpoises and several birds, both tailed ones and Gannets. In the P.M. strong breeze and cloudy weather. Saw three sails steering to the E. Water Blue and full of Yellow Drops.

Lat. 43.47 N. Long. 23.00 W.

Wednesday Sept. 11th 1878

Comes in with strong gales from S.E. and thick cloudy weather. Ship by the wind to the W. with all sail out. Water Green all day. Saw in the A.M. quite a number of birds, mostly long-tailed ones. At 12 M. the wind hauled to the S.W. and clearing barometer weather but falling barometer. In the P.M. foggy weather. Saw one sail steering to the E.

Lat. 43.23 N. Long. 23.30 W.

Thursday Sept. 12th 1878

Comes in with strong gales from S.E. and stormy weather. Ship by the wind to the S. and W. with all sail out. Water Green in the A.M. Blue in P.M.

Lat. 43.05 N. Long. by Cal. 26.30 W.

With Atlantic Ocean in the year of 1878

Friday Sept. 13th 1878

Comes in with strong gales from S.E. and wet rainy weather. Ship by the wind to the S.W. with all sail out. Bound for the Azores. Water Blue all day. One sail in sight steering to the E.

Lat. 43.00 N. Long. 28.30 W.

Saturday Sept. 14th 1878

Comes in with moderate breezes from S.W. and clear weather. the wind having hauled from S.E. to S.W. at 1 A.M. with clearing weather. Ship by the wind to the W.N.W. with all sail out, cruising. Water Blue & clear. Saw through the day two sails bound to the E. At 8 A.M. tacked ship to the S.E. At 3 P.M. tacked back again. At night light air.

Lat. 41.45 N. Long. 30.30 W.

Sunday Sept. 15th 1878

Comes in with light winds from the E. and fine weather. Ship steering S.W. per compass with all sail out for Flores. Water Blue and full of Yellow Drops and animalcules. Saw one sail by the wind to the N. In the P.M. cloudy weather looking much like rain. At sunset nothing in sight. By Cal. two bearing S.W. per compass. Dist. 40 miles.

Lat. 40.56 N. Long. 30.40 W.

Monday Sept. 16th 1878

Comes in with fresh breezes from S.E. and hazy weather. Ship by the wind on different tack working up windward with all sail out. At 8 A.M. raised two bearing S.W. Dist. about 8 miles. At 9 raised the Island of Flores bearing S.W. Dist. 10 miles and working up for Ponta Delgada all the A.M. at 2 P.M. left the ship for the shore. Dist. about 3 miles. Laying off and on at Ponta Delgada was Bk. Wave Capt. Hammond of C.B. nothing this season. 400 bbls. all cold 22 months out. Obtained at Ponta Delgada a few 2 Potatoes Eggs Fowls &c. Capt. H. of the Wave came on board in the eve. and remained until 10 o'clock.
