Remarks on Board Monday June 9th

Comes in with moderate breezes from E. N. and over-
 ship by the wind with all sail out cruising to the
 N. In the P. M. got a light breeze from the E.
 Nothing in sight all day. Steering S. W. by W.
 Lat. 37.58 S. Soundings 62 fath.

Tuesday June 10th 1879

Comes in with moderate breezes from S. and E. and
 weather but cold. Ship by the wind to the S. W. with
 sail out cruising. Water rather green with but a few
 birds. Nothing in sight all day. At sunset nearly
 calm. Lat. 40.09 S. Long 58.48 W. Soundings 62 fath.

Wednesday June 11th 1879

Comes in with a gale of wind and rain from the
 and thick hazy weather. Ship by the wind to the E.
 N. E. under storm sails. Nothing in sight all day.
 Lat. 41.28 S. Soundings 55 fath.

Thursday June 12th 1879

Comes in with moderate breezes from the N. E. N. and
 and overcast. Ship by the wind to the E. with
 sail out cruising. In the A. M. Blacksmith repaired
 Drift to mainmast having discovered yesterday that it
 was broken. In the P. M. had mainmast slung up
 and mainsail set. At 1 P. M. raised a K. T. by
 Mr. Wrightington, going quite moderate, but too
 for the boats. to the E. N. E. made a tack for
 but lost sight by his going to the windward. At
 night quite moderate.

Lat. 41.38 S. Long 58.35 W. Soundings 55 fath.

Friday June 13th 1879

Comes in with fresh breezes from the E. N. E. and hazy
 weather. Ship by the wind to the E. until 3 P. M.
 when tacked to the W. with all prudent sail out
 ing. Nothing in sight all day but a few birds.
 Water clear and blue all day.

Lat. 41.14 S. Long 57.40 W. Soundings 55 fath.

Coast of Patagonia in the Year of 1879

Remarks on Board Saturday June 14th

Comes in with strong breezes from E. N. E. and hazy weather.
 Ship by the wind to the W. with all prudent sail out, cruising.
 At 8 A. M. saw a K. T. Whale going quick to the S. W.
 at 9 lowered three boats and chased until 12 when
 lost the run of him. Mr. Wrightington went on shore and
 started but the whale being too far off, did not fasten.
 In the P. M. ship standing to the E. N. E. a part
 of the P. M. thick fog.

Lat. 41.24 S. Soundings 60 fath.

Sunday June 15th

Comes in with moderate breezes from the W. and quite
 fine weather - good seeing - but nothing in sight but birds
 and Penguins. Ship on various courses through the day.
 In the A. M. ship working to the E. N. E. In the P. M.
 to the S. Saw a finback near night.

Lat. 40.55 S. Long 47.56 W. Soundings 52 fath.

Monday June 16th 1879

Comes in with light breezes from E. N. E. and rainy weather.
 Ship by the wind to the S. E. At 7 were ship to the
 S. W. the wind hauling to the E. under easy sail.
 at 9 clear up a little when we started the works to
 bail our last whale taken on the 14th inst. At 12
 wind to the N. W. but still overcast. poor seeing.
 Nothing in sight all day. Soundings in morn 95 fath.

Lat. 41.02

Tuesday June 17th 1879

Comes in with moderate breezes from W. N. W. and quite
 clear weather. Ship by the wind to the E. with all sail
 out cruising. Cooled down in early morn the whale turn-
 ing up on deck 35 bbls. In the P. M. ship standing
 S. S. W. - nothing in sight all day, but a few birds
 Penguins and 3 porpoises.

Lat. 41.06 S. Long 57.43 W. Soundings 55 fath.

Wednesday June 18th 1879

Comes in with light air from the E and calm, with
 thick hazy weather. Employed in storing oil in main
 hold, getting out water &c. Received 30 bbls oil the make
 of the last whale. Lat. 41.08 S. Soundings 52 fath.
