

Remarks on Board Ship (Dartmouth)

Thursday 7th Feb

First part of these 24 hours fair to fine so fine that we have no wind off the Cape from beating in with light wind then fine bearing N.E. W from the Cape cannot lay for it middle part strong winds & daylight Cape from bearing S.E. running in S.W. wind N.E. W & came in off fathoms water and further the sail a Horatice with plenty of rain and blowing hand went on shore and got a wash girl and come of again

March 12th

First part of these 24 hours waiting for wind sent the girls on shore middle part fine could not get any sleep for the want of a pair of shoes had none for 2 weeks ~~the~~ running & daylight got under weigh with the wind S.W. and stood out for sea stowed the anchors and cleared the decks got some altitudes 5 miles from the Cape and that bearing South for the ~~the~~ S light (Pine) ~~the~~ as the devil got some altitudes from the long 17° 16' without the correction and that 3' to be added

March 13th

First part of these 24 hours fine winds from the S.W. course E. N.E. middle part the same & daylight took the altitudes Capt Butler bound in to the Bay latter part strong winds as old

March 14th

First part of these 24 hours strong winds from the West course E. N.E. under doublet ship & night shortened sail our course middle part the same latter part no alteration

March 15th

First part of these 24 hours back up the North course E. N.E. winds West with a heavy sea & night set half watches middle part the same latter more moderate set the boats on the Venus course E. N.E.

Saturday March 16th

First part of these 24 hours moderate course E. N.E. winds N.E. W. middle part huffed too to the N.E. W latter part fine weather all sail out to the North

Sunday March 17th

First part of these 24 hours fine all sail out to the North middle part Calm latter part light winds from the North saw Blackall

Monday March 18th

First part of these 24 hours fine steering to the East under N.E. & a night shortened sail to the East middle part & latter strong winds and rainy all sail out

Long by Chron 174° 29' West Lat by Obs 33° 11' S

Tuesday March 19th

First part of these 24 hours strong winds from the N.E. & under Top Sail to the East cloudy & sun took in sail under doublet ship main Top Sail middle part and latter foggy with rain steering to the N.E. Long by Chron 174° 00' West Lat 33° 24'

Wednesday March 20th

First part of these 24 hours Breeze & a raised which lowered and struck to the S.E. about 10 miles had to cut come on board & night heard some light with light winds from the N.E. W middle and latter part strong winds from the N.E. E steering East

Long by Chron 173° 19' West Lat by Obs 33° 23' South

Thursday March 21st

First part of these 24 hours fresh winds from the N.E. & E. took the ship to the N.E. W. & under shortened sail middle part rainy latter part cloudy of the ship Logan at 10 miles out 360th Spence Capt Briggs Lat 32° 48' South

Friday March 22nd

First part of these 24 hours thick weather in company with the S winds N.E. W. laying to the West middle part rainy latter part more clear under doublet

Long by Chron 174° 43' West Lat by Obs 35° 15' S

Saturday March 23rd

First part of these 24 hours fine in company with the Logan & under shortened sail to the North with to the West middle and latter part heavy the S in light steering to the North

Obs 36° 11' S
