

June Continued Laying to anchor at Anabona

Wednesday 16th

This twenty four hours Employed in getting off wood & water. Received one cord of wood & 25 Bbls water making 70 Bbls in all & four cords of wood. Capt. traded for more & three Bbls potatoes. Latter part weather the same. Employed in watering received 30 Bbls. So ends

Thursday 17th

This fore part by no account Employed in getting off water & wood & Stomach bags received two cords of wood & 25 Bbls water. Weather good but very warm being moderate. Latter part moderate. Employed in getting water & getting up & getting the head rigging up by Stint and watch on shore on liberty finished getting water. So ends

Friday 18th

This day very moderate. Capt. brought off 40 chickens Employed in getting up head rigging & trying to sheet the ship to point. The Stowage but could not. The vessel so. Latter part employed in getting up the top gallant rigging & sheeting the ship to point. Sent the last watch on shore on liberty. One man stayed over his time. So ends

Saturday 19th

This twenty four hours commenced with good but warm weather. Capt. broke out the run which he has held the care of for the last five months & found one Bbl Sugar wet also one barrel of beans. The watch all came off excepting one man named Cloud. Payot. Have killed six wild pigeons. Capt. bought some brown maning. Latter part employed in repairing port boards & work over the long Starboard watch on shore on liberty. So ends

June Continued Sunday 20th

This twenty four hours light air from all points. Still at anchor at Anabona. The brig Herald left this port received two barrels of potatoes which makes eight in all & three of oranges & a lot of Bananas. One hundred Pine apples & 50 coconuts & one half boat load making six cords & one half of a cord. Cloud Payot still on shore. Latter part good breeze. Port watch on shore on liberty. So ends

Monday 21st

This day weather fine at sundown came on board after stowing on shore all day. At daylight put the Starboard in the water & the other boat across the stern. Employed in clearing decks. Capt. would not let the Negroes come on deck & then went on shore & tried to ship a man but could not. I don't blame them. That Cloud Payot was no where to be found having left the ship last Friday came on board at noon got under way at noon. Steered E N E. So ends. Saw one fish flying off & on

Tuesday 22nd

This afternoon moved most heads had anchoring all stowed. Employed in re-hanging fruit & packing ones potatoes. Steering off E at 3⁰⁰ 30' land disappeared bearing N E 4th Dist. 15 miles. Had all sail set wind about South. Through the night Steered E N E. At 4 A.M. luffed to the wind with jib sheets to windward at 5 A.M. kept her off E. 1/2 N. At seven saw the Island of St. Thomas bearing to the N E 4th dist 10 miles at 12 M. Port 22nd. So ends
