

April of 1840

Monday 11th

another fine day
at daylight all hands
board employed in putting
on new throat seizing on the
Starboard Main rigging Seams

Tuesday 2th

To day weather good expecting
a few clouds, of Scotch mist, received 8
Grown Shrimp 15. both Bay & three Dorrells
of back, also two Dorrells of Beams & some
Roach swimming, celebrated wth 20 Bbls Flour
& three oars day ends with Showers

Wednesday 12th

For day the first part
Showery but fine I'm hoist up the anchor
& made sail sent the boat in for the
Captain & one of the boatsteerers which
had been on shore ever since ~~at~~ we have
been here he belonged on the Island
but he was drunk so the old man
sailed & neither one of them came off
Delayed off & on at eight this morn.
sent in the boat boat & the crew
off, Steered down the land to the
Southward & west Sent 15. 17 & 18.

Thursday 14th

Then, my first part steering to the said heading I off by South South West point bearing N.E. distant 12 miles at 11 AM Gentlest part wind S.E. at 1 PM locked in shore at 12 found one man belonging to the ~~2d~~ Globe kept her off steering for the port of Bonine town, & ends

Friday 15th

Today opens with fine
S. breeze steering down the canal
at four P.M. sent the boat in with
the Capt. & the run away. At eight P.M.
the boat came off without the Capt.
with orders to lay off & on Middle
bury off & on Oct. Day light sent a boat
for the Capt. at eight came to anchor in
9 fathom water sent up the breaking out
trunk & went to breaking the hold on
the Starboard side

Saturday 16th

Mr. Day employed in
breaking out oil broke out 19 coppers
25 lbs. This morning out eight the
Lieut. sent refused to take his Liberty
Further employed in Storing Back on
the Starboard Side. See Lists

Sunday 17th 18th

This first part sea time
employed in breaking out on the first
Lick Middle & latter weather good

Monday 18th

Shore part weather good
this day had no watch ashore on liberty
through the night the off watch went
this morning checked on & started out the
remaining part of the oil last night the
second & waste went on shore & has
not come off as yet. got from a ship in
the harbor six casks for oil & found
them

Sen Smith turned to his duty

Mr. Smith asked the Consul for his discharge.
