

Bank Inaco of New Bedford

Tuesday July 15<sup>th</sup> 1844

Begins with a heavy gale from the SW and squally heading WNW at 2 PM veered ship to the SE. Barometer 29.5. A dear gale of wind this point the same at 5 AM veered ship and steered SE by N at 10 AM. M.R. saw the land the weather more moderate Bar 29.5 Lat 35-26 S Long 117 15 E

Wednesday July 17<sup>th</sup> 1844

Begins with strong breezes from WSW at 2 PM the land about 10 miles distant from NW to SE. A dear ship and stood off at 5 spoke the ship Brunswick along of N. Bedford 600 800 miles out. Laid off on an through the night at daylight the land about 8 miles distant steered off for the Sound bent the cables on and got the anchors ready

Thursday July 18<sup>th</sup> 1844

Begins with fresh breezes from the WNW at 1 PM we were about one mile from E. Lipse Islands took a squall from the NW and thick headed off shore about 9 miles from the anchorage at 2 it blowed a heavy gale from west took the anchors on the bow and made fast for a gale Bar 29.5 mid part continues blowing a heavy gale at 4 AM the wind headed to the SE and moderate some veered ship and set the fore & reefed main sail steered west but the wind increased again took the in headed west Lat 35-36 S Long 118 40 E

Friday July 19<sup>th</sup> 1844

Begins with fresh gales from the SW and a heavy sea heading N. at 3 PM set the fore sail reefed there is hard times heading in and currents but the land known what is best for us and our little port more moderate McDoull said at 10 AM had Head home NW 8 miles got the anchors ready and run in

Saturday July 20<sup>th</sup> 1844

Begins with gentle breezes at 4 PM anchored in King Georges Sound in 8 fathoms of water and then went in the harbour

Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> Aug 1844

Begins with fresh gales from the south the ship laying in the Sound from July 21<sup>st</sup> Aug 10 lying inside getting recruits water & 4 men desert one taken aboard gone one week taken 40 miles off Lewis F. Baker said Levitts Peter McDermott gone 3 days taken 50 miles off ships 2 men 10 went out in the sound but had weather detained in one week at 4 AM took the anchor and stood out with light squalls from the SW 30 in

Sunday Aug 18<sup>th</sup> 1844

Begins with gentle breezes from the SW heading to the SE at 6 PM the wind headed to the S to the N. G. D. near mount Koning at daylight took a strong breeze from the SW headed WSW double reefed the top sails rose-mount Gardner to the N about 40 miles distant S. E. D.

Monday Aug 19<sup>th</sup> 1844

Begins with a strong gale from the NW and rain at 4 PM close reefed the main to sail and took in the fore took in the waist Boat got ready for a blow Mid and latter wind W and squally heading S to SW Lat 36.49 S Long 118 35 E

Tuesday August 20<sup>th</sup> 1844

Begins with fresh gales from the WSW and squally at 1 PM veered ship to the NW at 5 AM veered to the SW latter part the same Lat 36 46 S Long 118 09 E

Wednesday Aug 21<sup>st</sup> 1844

Begins with strong gales from the W and squalls of hail at 4 PM took in the fore sail at 6 veered ship to the NW lost a flag overboard. Bar 29.5 Mid on 7 part the same the wind S latter more moderate made some sail Bar 29.5
