Thursday Sept 1st 1845

Begins with light trades and clear heading
2nd saw - five Backs Porpoises & I am sick
to night at 2 am tacked to the SW

Lat 10 45 S Long 113 00

Friday Sept 2nd 1845

Begins with gentle trades and cloudy heading
2nd saw - a Bark supposed to be the
Adventure of London heading to the WSW
at 10 am tacked to the SW & later the same

Lat 11 16 Long 112 30 E

Saturday Sept 3rd 1845

Begins with gentle breezes and cloudy
heading SWW saw - a Bark to the Searoad
No Whales No Whales Mid and latter parts
heading S by W Lat 11 49 S Long 111 50

Sunday Sept 4th 1845

Begins with gentle breezes and clear heading
SWW saw - nothing Mid and latter parts
the same at 6 am tacked to the S by E

Lat 12 22 S Long 111 30

Monday Sept 5th 1845

Begins with gentle trades and clear
heading SWW at 6 PM tacked to the S by W
saw - Nothing Mid and latter parts the same

Lat 11 51 Long 112 10 E

Tuesday Sept 6th 1845

Begins with fresh trades and clear heading
SWW saw - Porpoises at 8 PM tacked to the
E no Whales & Genl look upon us in
Mercy Mid and latter part strong breezes

Lat 11 35 S Long 112 40

Wednesday Sept 7th 1845

Begins with strong breezes from SSE and clear
heading E saw - jumpers and five Backs at 12 Mid
nord ship to the SWW latter the same

Lat 11 42 Long 112 25 E

Gave the Cooper & Blows with the main top
gallant blue line for discharging the First Officer

On the Indian Ocean

Thursday Sept 11th 1845

Begins with fresh trades and clear heading
SWW saw - nothing no whales Mid and latter
parts light wind nothing to be seen

Lat 12 43 S Long 111 50

Friday Sept 12th 1845

Begins with light trades and clear heading
SWW at night tacked to the ESE
saw - jumpers at 11 am tacked to the SWW

Lat 13 08 Long 111 25

Saturday Sept 13th 1845

Begins with gentle trades and cloudy
heading SWW at night tacked to the
E by N Mid and latter heading E by S
30 200s another week and saw whales

Lat 13 17 S Long 111 55 E

Sunday Sept 14th 1845

Begins with gentle breezes from S by E
heading E by S the current appears
not to run as strong as usual Mid
and latter parts fresh gales

Lat 13 53 S Long 113 15 E

Monday Sept 15th 1845

Begins with fresh breezes and clear heading
E by S at night veered ship to the SW and shortened
but Come Whales Come at 2 am tacked to the
E at 8 am the crew complained that
the Cook had stolen goods from them there
has been a great number of complaints
against him before but could not be
proved to my satisfaction but this was
a very clear case seized him up and
gave him 3 1/2 floggs with the cat
he is one of the greatest Liars that
I ever saw - I should like to break him
of it & the trouble of sailors
