Begins with strong breeze from S.W. breeze variable the
New Badger. In company Middle part under short sail. latter
part steering N. strong breeze & heavy S.W. Wind. Lat. 23 45.9
the Badger. In sight. Long 109. 52.6

Saturday, March, the 22nd 1852

Begins with strong breeze from S.W. heading S.W. under
short sail. at 4 P.M. spoke the New Badger. & Bot. from
Capt. Perkins, one piece of Keesie barrels, & 18.00. Middle
& latter part strong gale heading S.W. under short sail.
Lat. 23. 58.9
Long 108. 50.6

Sunday, March, the 23rd 1852

Begins with strong gale from S.W. heading S. under short
sail. the New Badger in sight. Middle part took in the fore sail
heading S.W. latter part light breeze made sail steering S.W. wind
Lat. 23. 50.9
Long 108. 45.6

Monday, March, the 24th 1852

Begins with light breeze from S.W. steering S.W. the
New Badger. In sight. Middle part under short sail heading S. latter
part moderate & rising heading to the eastward. No wh.

One sail in sight

Tuesday, March, the 25th 1852

Begins with fresh breeze from N.W. with light rain, steering
S. one sail in sight. Middle part under short sail light breeze
& variable latter part light breeze from the S.W. Made sail
steering S. as before
Lat. 23. 23.9
Long 109. 11

Finished the boat under the sailing.

Wednesday, March, the 31st 1852

Begins with moderate breeze from the S.W. steering S.W.
Middle part S.W. under short sail. Spoke the Ship Sea. latter part light
breeze made sail steering S.W.
Lat. 26. 38.9
Long 109. 36.6

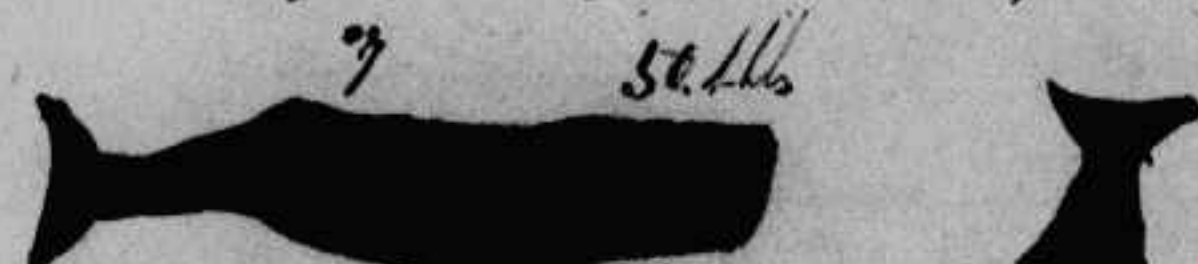
Spoke the Ship, Young Phoenix 35 months out. 1850.

Thursday, April the 1st 1852

Begins with light breeze from S.W. heading S. Spoke the
Young Phoenix Middle part under short sail. latter part made
sail steering S.W. as before
Lat. 25. 45.9
Long 110. 20.6

Friday, April, the 2nd 1852

Begins with moderate breeze from the S.W. heading S.W.
Middle part under short sail. latter part made sail & secured a ship
heading S.W. employed in repairing the gun. no wh. in sight.
Lat. 25. 33.9
Long 110. 20.6



Saturday, April, the 3rd 1852

Begins with fresh breeze from S.W. heading S.W. at 3 P.M.
saw sperm whale, at 4, lowered three boats, struck two whales
the Iron boat the line off one whale, spouting blood, at
6, took one whale to the ship took up the boat & took in
sail heading S.W. at 6 began to abate, at 12. Two finished light breeze
Lat. 25. 38.9
Long 109. 50.6

Sunday, April, the 4th 1852

Begins with light. air from the S.W. heading S.W. at 2.
began to hail the Head. Middle & latter part light air & calm.
heading S.W. employed in boiling.
Lat. 25. 50.9
Long 109. 30.6
