Tuesday 12th 1867

Bright breeze from Northward and pleasant steering
C. H. Hatfield sail set at 4 o'clock P. M. raised the
Isle of Pal bearing N. W. distant about 40 miles
thus ends this day Lat 42° N. Long 22.42' W.

Wednesday

Wednesday 13th 1867

Bright breeze and pleasant at sunrise kept of N. W. W.
for the Isle of Pal which is in sight at 3 o'clock
came to anchor in Woodro Bay found one
vessel here the W. Martin of 16 Bbls Specs.

Thursday 14th 1867

Fresh breeze and pleasant bent our old suit
of sails and stowed the new ones away a Breeze
came to anchor of Turtle point so ends this day

Friday 15th

Bright breeze and pleasant chased Wumbachs within
saw the W. Martin went to sea painted the
mast heads B. B. C.

Saturday 16th 1867

Fine pleasant weather the wind exmplies from N. W.
all hands employed in ships duties no whales in
sight

Sunday 17th 1867

Fine pleasant weather with the wind well from the
eastward at 11 o'clock A. M. the warst Boat
went on shore at 1 o'clock P. M. the boat returned
with all that left in her with the exceptions
of the 2nd mate and 2 of the oarsmen that stayed
ed ashore because they could not get aboard

Monday 18th 1867

This morning a shore boat came of bringing the
three that stayed ashore last night then took our
anchor and stood out to sea steering N. W. West
with a fresh breeze with all sail set as we came
out saw a schooner going in did not ascertain
who she was at sunset shortened sail the Island
of St. Nicolas to the westward also saw Blacked

Tuesday 19th 1867

Fresh breeze and pleasant steering by the wind to the
N. West under all sail saw one sail the Island
of St. Vincent about 40 miles to the westward
saw Wumbachs Porpoises and Killers so ends this day

Wednesday 20th 1867

Fresh trades and pleasant steering different courses
to the Southward under easy sail saw a bark
steering to the S. W. so ends the day
