Thursday 10th 1867

Fresh breeze and fine pleasant weather Steering S. E.
by S. E. under all sail wind from the Southward
at 2 o'clock ^{P.M.} passed the Island of Pico bearing S. E. by
Compass distant about 100 miles
Lat 38.21 N. Long 30.01 W.

Friday 11th 1867

Light variable winds encline to calms working
along shore of Fayal to wards the anchorage saw
one sail employed in washing ship so ends the day.

Saturday 12th 1867

Light changeable winds and pleasant working up
Fayal channel at 9 o'clock ^{A.M.} came to anchor in 12 fath-
oms took council, moorings employed in getting up
purchase and the necessary duties previous to
breaking out our oil so ends the day.

Sunday 13th 1867

Fresh breeze from N. W. with some rain the Brig
Warren Will sailed so ends the day.

Monday 14th 1867

Light breeze from the Northward and fine pleasant
weather employed in beaking out oil discharged
9 casks of Sperm Oil 228 gallons the Brig
Herald of Warren off and on.

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Tuesday 15th 1867 Oct.

Strong S. W. winds and rainy employed in
storing casks and filling salt water
The Brig Herman Smith of Boston came to
an anchor two Barks and a Brig of and on.

Wednesday 16th 1867

Wind from N. E. and fine pleasant weather
received on board 6 barrels of Beef and 3 Casks
of Flour finished stowing of the hold sent on
shore the common strap and Neartingale gages
for repairs and also delivered per order 2 barrels
of Blackfish Oil and 1 barrel of Petroleum

Friday 18th 1867

Light breeze from S. W. and fine pleasant
weather the Starboard watch ashore on liberty
the other watch employed in the fore rigging.

Saturday 19th 1867

Light breeze from S. W. and pleasant the
Starboard watch ashore on liberty the other
watch employed in the Main rigging.

Sunday 20th 1867

Fresh breeze from S. W. and fine pleasant weather
Starboard watch on shore on liberty four of
the Port watch deserted.
