

Remarks on board Schr. E. H. Hoatfield
Wednesday, July, 27th 1881.

First part of these 24 hours begin with very light airs from the Eastward steering to the Westward middle and latter part calm saw some Grampuses. watches variously employed.

Thursday, July, 28th

First part of these 24 hours begin with a calm saw a large school of Comfish. middle part a light breeze from the Eastward scho lying to on the Starboard tack. latter part wind the same at 6 A.M. kept off W. N. West. one sail in sight a merchantman bound to the westward.

Long. 48.47. W.

Friday, July, 29th.

First part of these 24 hours begin with a light breeze from the Eastward steering W. N. West. middle part wind freshening some Schr lying to on port tack under foresail. latter part blowing fresh kept off at 6 A.M. West watch employed in breaking out provisions passed in sight of a Steamer.

Lat. 31.02. N.

Long. 50.10. W.

First part of these 24 hours begin with strong breezes from the E. steering West. at 3:20 P.M. hauled to the wind on port tack heading South. one sail in sight suppose it to be a whaling Schr. middle part wind the same saw ship at midnight and headed to the N. and at 6 A.M. more ship again and steered by the wind on port tack Schr still in sight. saw two schools of Blackfish but did not lower.

Sunday, July, 31st 1881.

First part of these 24 hours begin with strong breezes from the Eastward at 1 P.M. more ship and steered W. N. West saw a school of B. Fish at sunset hauled by the wind on the port tack heading about South and lay to all night. latter part moderate breezes from E. at 6 A.M. more ship and steered west. N. West.

Monday, August, 1st 1881.

First part of these 24 hours begin with moderate breezes from the Eastward steering W. N. West. at 4 P.M. spoke the Schr Admiral Blake of Marion & mouthed with 60 Bbls. Sperm. middle part blowing strong from the northward hauled by the wind on port tack at dark and lay to all night. more ship at sunrise and steered by the wind heading about N. N. W. wind N. East. blowing heavy

Lat. 30.45. N.

Long. 52.00. W.

Tuesday August 2nd.

First part of these 24 hours begin with strong breezes from N. East steering by the wind on the S. tack heading N. N. W. middle part moderating some and passing rain squalls ship lying to on S. tack. latter part moderate breezes from N. E. at sunrise kept off. W. S. West. watches variously employed. a whaling Schr in sight
