Wednesday, Nov. 23^d

These 24 hours begin with moderate breezes from E. S. E. at 2 P. M. wind backing into N. N. E. tacked ship and steered by the wind on the port tack heading S. E. and S. E. by E. middle part wind about the same with passing squalls latter part strong breezes from E. N. E. steering the same heading about S. E. watch employed in ship's duty.

Thursday, Nov. 24th

These 24 hours begin with strong breezes from E. N. E. steering by the wind on the port tack heading about S. E. middle part squally wind about the same latter part moderate breezes from E. N. E. heading S. E. and S. E. by S. watch employed in breaking out water.

Friday, Nov. 25th

These 24 hours begin with moderate breezes from E. N. E. steering by the wind on the port tack heading about S. E. middle and latter part strong breezes from N. E. by E. steering by the wind heading about S. E. by E.

Saturday, Nov. 26th

These 24 hours begin with strong breezes from N. E. by E. steering full and by the wind heading about S. E. by E. middle part wind the same with passing rain squalls latter part strong breezes from E. N. E. steering full and by heading about S. E. watch variously employed in ship's duty.

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Sunday, Nov. 27th 1881.

These 24 hours begin with strong breezes from E. N. E. steering by the wind on the port tack heading about S. E. middle and latter part strong breezes from E. by N. steering full and off the wind on the port tack heading about S. E. by E. passed in sight of a Schr. steering to the Northward.

Monday, Nov. 28th

These 24 hours begin with strong breezes from E. by N. steering by the wind heading S. E. by S. middle and latter part blowing heavy from the Eastward at 12. midnight took in the mainsail and flying jib and set trysail steering by the wind on the port tack heading about S. E. by S. watch variously employed in ship's duty.

Tuesday, Nov. 29th

These 24 hours begin with strong breezes from the Eastward steering by the wind on the port tack heading about S. E. by S. middle and latter part wind and weather much the same and steering the same watch variously employed in ship's duty. Passed a large Steamer steering to S. West.
