Thursday, Jan. 26th 1882

All these 24 hours remained lying at anchor. weather variously employed rather fine.

Friday, Jan. 27th

All these 24 hours remained lying at anchor. weather fine. today Sch. Antarctic of Provincetown came in two months from home with 15-bbls Sperm.

Saturday, Jan. 28th

All these 24 hours remained lying at anchor. weather fine and moderate.

Sunday, Jan. 29th

All these 24 hours remained lying at anchor. blowing heavy from the N.E. the last part of the day.

Monday, Jan. 30th

All these 24 hours remained lying at anchor weather very boisterous today Sch. Edward, Sec. of Provincetown arrived here and anchored. 7 months from home with nothing. at dark dropped the 2nd anchor. it blowing a gale from the N.E. East.

Tuesday, Jan. 31st

All these 24 hours remained lying at anchor. blowing heavy from the N.E.

Wednesday Feb. 1st 1882.

All these 24 hours remained lying at anchor. today Mr Terry the American Consul called aboard and informed us that he had received orders from the Hatfield's owners to displace the Captain and put a responsible person in his place and detain the vessel until the arrival of the Bark. Genie Cushman now on her way like the American Consul put Mr Jasper Ears in the Captain's place until further orders. a man who has been acting as mate since Mr Higgins discharge.
