

Remarks on board Schr. E. H. Hatfield
Monday, Feb. 5th 1882

All these 24 hours lying at anchor and finished painting the vessel. blowing strong from the N. East.

Tuesday, Feb. 6th

All these 24 hours lying at anchor blowing heavy from the N. East.

Wednesday, Feb. 7th

All these 24 hours lying at anchor at 8 A.M. weighed anchor and went further in the harbor and more out of the way of passing vessels. also employed in scraping down the topmast.

Thursday, Feb. 8th

All these 24 hours remained lying at anchor crew employed in scraping. The lower masts. received a visit from the vice Consul today.

Friday, Feb. 10th

All these 24 hours remained lying at anchor. blowing heavy from the N.E. last night James Tripp one of the crew went ashore and has not returned. and suppose he has deserted. 3^d mate still sick. Consul has taken him ashore and boarded him judging he will be better ashore than aboard the vessel his complaint being rheumatism.

Remarks on board Schr. E. H. Hatfield
Saturday, Feb. 11th 1882

All these 24 hours remained lying at anchor. weather fine with strong breezes. at 8 A.M. saw a Hump-back whale did not lower on acct of he being in deep water.

Sunday, Feb. 12th

All these 24 hours remained lying at anchor weather thick & overcast.

Monday, Feb. 13th

All these 24 hours remained lying at anchor weather thick and overcast.

Tuesday, Feb. 14th

All these 24 hours remained lying at anchor weather clear and fine at 8 A.M. lowered two boats and looked for hump backs. saw one but did not care to strike he being in deep water.

Wednesday, Feb. 15th

All these 24 hours remained lying at anchor moderate breezes from N.E. boats off and on cruising for Hump-backs saw a number but they were very shy did not strike.

Thursday, Feb. 16th

All these 24 hours remained lying at anchor. moderate breezes from N.W. E.
