

January 1845
Sunday 5th

Commence with strong trades,
at 1 P.M. boat returned on board
with fruit, leaving one man
on shore for the purpose of seeing
his mother, as he has been
absent from home 15 years it did
not seem to be right for him
to leave home without seeing her
sacked about during the night,
at daylight finished boiling
the whales, at 9 A.M. sent one
boat on shore to the ends
there 24 hours

Monday 6th

Commence with strong trades, at 4
P.M. came on board and steered S.W.
leaving an English schooner laying
off and on, at 8 A.M. saw fog
bearing S.W., at 9 A.M. steered S.W.
so ends there 24 hours

Tuesday 7th

Commence with light airs,
at 3 P.M. trades strong took in
jib and mainsail, middle
and latter part the same
so ends there 24 hours latitude
by Obs, 12° 04'

Wednesday 8th

Commence with strong trades,
steering S.W. & under doubled
reefed topsails and courses,
middle part the same latter
part more moderate, so ends
there 24 hours latitude by
observation 9° 23'

Thursday 9th

Commence with fresh trades
and smoky weather, steering
S.W. & middle and latter part
light trades, so ends there 24
hours latitude by Obs 7° 08'

Friday 10th

Commence with light trades
and pleasant weather, steering
S.W. & middle and latter part
the same, saw one ship standing
to the Northwards, so ends there
24 hours latitude by Obs, 5° 00' lon-
gitude 20° 30'

Saturday 11th

Commence with light airs, at 1
P.M. saw a ship standing to the
S.W., supposed her to be a whale
man, middle and latter part
squally with a plenty of rain
so ends there 24 hours No observation

Sunday 12th

Commence with calms and a plenty
of rain, saw the ship off the
lee beam, middle part the same
latter part light airs and variable,
& sails in sight, so ends there 24
hours latitude by Obs, 2° 50' North

Monday 13th

Commence with light airs from
the North, steering S.W. & N.,
middle and latter part calm
and rain, 10 vessels in sight,
so ends there 24 hours No observation
