

Boarded Por. The Abrolhos Banks in the year 1845
Remarks on Board Wednesday Sept^r the 18th 1845
These 24 hours commenced with baffling winds and pleasant
weather the Bark heading West under all sail Middle part
and latter the same so ends these 24 hours no lat no long

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Remarks on Board Thursday September the 19th
These 24 hours commenced with light winds from the SE
and the Bark heading N^W under all sail middle part
fresh gales from the NE and the Barque steering West
Saw several merchant ships at 10 AM saw a sail comm-
ing for us it proved to be the Brig Inga of Wareham 4
months out Endicott's Commander spoke her and
he came on board and stopped until 10 AM and then
went on board daylight saw her of the Weather beam
steering to the Northward Middle part much
the same so ends these 24 hours Lat by obs 18° 18' S
Long by Cr 36° 28' W

Remarks on Board Friday September the 20th
These 24 hours commenced with light winds from the
SE and the Bark heading N^W under all sail
with several merchant ships in sight Middle
part much the same latter part much the same
with 6 sails in sight so ends

False writings

On the Abrolhos Banks in 1845 Barque Elizabeth Daggett
Remarks on Board Saturday September the 21st 1845
These 24 hours commenced with light winds & pleasant weather
the Barque heading N^W under all sail saw 6 or 7 sails
in sight Middle part saw a sail standing towards us she came
within 3 miles of us to the windward and we hauled up the main
sail but there was no prospect of her getting to us before
night so the Captain lowered our port and went on board
it proved to be the General of N^W we got some news Middle
part much the same so ends Lat by obs 18° 10' S Long by Cr 36° 28' W

Remarks on Board Sunday September the 22nd 1845
These 24 hours commenced with light winds and the Barque heading
to the Westward under all sail several sails in sight saw
our lee beam a Bark supposed to be the Bark Sarah of
Mattapoisett Mayhew run for her at 4 PM spoke her it
proved to be the one expected the Sally Mayhew she had
just come from St Catharines and fetched letters from
our old Captain he said we must not come into any
Brazilian Port except it was Montevideo and there we
should find him but of no use latter part fresh gales
the Bark heading to the Eastward saw several sails
so ends these 24 hours Lat 18° 25' S Long 36° 48' W

Remarks on Board Monday September the 23^d 1845 These 24 hours
commenced with brisk winds from the Northward and the Bark
heading to the Westward under all sail saw three sails Middle
part at noon sighted ship to the Eastward latter part much the
same so ends latitude by obs 18° 50' S Long by Cr 37° 19' W
