

Remarks On Board Wednesday October the 22nd 1845
 these 24 hours Commence with a gale of wind from the
 Northward and the Bark heading to the Westward at 5 P.M.
 worked to the E.N.E. with a plenty of right whales in
 sight but no good to us it being too rough to lower
 Boat into the water without getting stove Middle part
 much the same latter part wore ship to the S.E. the wind
 from the West Saw several finbacks and porpoises
 So ends lat 36-04 no longitude

Remarks on Board October 23rd 1845
 these 24 hours Commence with thick
 hazy weather the Bark heading to the
 S.E. wind to the S.W. with heavy
 swell saw several finbacks and porpoises
 Middle part much the same latter part a calm
 and very pleasant weather Saw everything but Spermo
 right whales the Bark heading no way in particular the wind
 veering to the S.W. at 10 A.M. set new maintopsail So ends these 24
 hours Latitude by observation 36-06" Long by Cr 44-18"

Remarks on Board October Friday the 24th 1845
 these 24 hours commence with a calm and pleasant weather
 the Bark veering from N.W. to West Saw everything but
 Sperrm whales or right whales Middle part brisk breeze from
 the Northward and the Bark steering N.E. under foretopsail
 and fore course and close reef maintopsail latter the

Cruising of the River de la Plata in the Bark Elizabeth 1845
 Remarks on Board Saturday October the 25th 1845
 these 24 hours begin with thick weather and raining and the wind
 from the Northward and the Bark steering N.E. under
 course and foretopsail caught one porpoise Saw several finbacks
 and a large piece of squid at 5th past 5 the Wind veered to the
 S.W. the Bark heading S and East at 4 past 6 wore ship
 to the N.W. close reefed the maintopsail daylight made all sail
 and kept her off N.W. at 8 A.M. took in the maintopgallant sail
 at Meridian raised a right Whale of the lea bow distance 1
 2 miles of kept her of for fine the waist boat galleyed him and
 came on board So ends these 24 hours Latitude 36-22" Long 46-51"

Remarks on Board Sunday Oct^r the 26th 1845
 these 24 hours begin with pleasant weather the wind from
 the Northward the boats in pursuit of the desired fish
 Saw a plenty of them all arounds at 4 P.M. the waist boat
 struck and drew from him at sunset shortened sail
 as common the whales in every direction at daylight set
 whole topsails and topgallant sails kept her off the N.W.
 at 8 A.M. saw 2 right whales of the lea
 bow kept her for them with success at 9 A.M. the
 larboard boat struck at Meridian took him along side
 and commenced cutting So ends these 24 hours
 Latitude 36-33 no longitude
