

Bark Elizabeth Off the River de la plate
 REMARKS ON BOARD TUESDAY DEC 2nd 1845
 there 24 hours commence with a fresh breeze from
 the N^W the bark steering S^W by S
 under easy sail at sunset shortened sail for
 the night middle part moderate daylight
 made all sail and stood to the west at
 meridian steered S^W by S so ends at sunset
 shortened sail

Remarks on Board Wednesday Dec 3rd 1845
 first part there 24 hours thick heavy weather
 the bark steering S^W by S at 4 P. M. raring took
 in sail middle part lighter daylight a fresh
 breeze from the S^W set double reefed topsails
 at 7 A. M. saw a bark to the N^E steering to the
 southward called it a merchantman at 9 A. M.
 wore ship and stood to the S^E set the jib &
 mainsail so ends. Lat 39° 35' Long 51° 40'

Remarks on Board Thursday Dec 4th 1845
 there 24 hours commence with a strong
 breeze from the S^W the bark steering S^E
 the same sail in sight at sunset shortened
 sail for the night and wore middle part more
 moderate daylight made all sail the wind light
 at 6 A. M. tack ship to S^W at 10 the wind increase & the
 end sail saw finbacks and grampuses
 Lat 39° 48' Long 51° 17'

Remarks on Board Friday December 5th 1845
 there 24 hours commence with fresh gales from
 the N^W the bark standing to the S^W
 at 2 P. M. hove to under a close reefed main
 topsail and wore ship the wind hauling
 to the S^W at 3 P. M. set the fore sail and
 stood N^W by N at 5 P. M. took in the foresail
 and luffed to the wind to the S^W middle
 part much the same the latter part much
 the same so ends. Lat 39° 04' Long 52° 10' 3/4

Remarks on Board Saturday Dec 6th 1845
 there 24 hours commence with fresh gales
 from the S^W the wind hauling to the
 West at 6 P. M. wore ship to the S^W the wind
 hauling to the North blowing fresh saw a me
 nber of birds middle part fresh gales from the
 N^W the bark standing to the S^W under short
 sail latter part more moderate set the foresail
 the water good for sperm whales Lat 38° 45' Long 50° 40'

Remarks on Board Sunday December the 7th 1845
 Remarks on Board Dec 7th 1845
 there 24 hours commence with a gentle breeze
 from the N^W the bark heading S by E under
 short sail at sunset luffed to the wind to the
 South daylight made all sail and steered S by E
 at 10 A. M. saw a large sperm whale going quick
 to the S^W lower two boats but of no use
